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#### THE GREAT ADVENTURES OF THE ERRAND BOY - A.M. Norton.

When Mr Arnold, known as 'Arnold the Carrier' returned from Leicester with the horse and dray my brother Alfie would be there ready to help with the parcels which had to be delivered around the village. There were other lads who in their turn had done this job and all with their own tales to tell. When they were too 'frit ' on a dark night to deliver a parcel to the top of Cemetery Road and coming back ran for their lives.

Alfie once delivered a parcel to a Mrs Kilbourn who lived next to the school in King Street, when she asked him "could you get a bike and go to Willoughby to fetch a cheese?" So Alfie got a bike, most likely hired from 'Bert Baums' and was ready to set off when me dad said "Did yer know that when you get there it will be your aunt? (me dad's sister 1914) so tell her we could do with a chaize". Then sure enough when Alfie got there it WAS his aunt and she sent us a cheese.

The Arnold family lived just below the school in Barrow Road when one late afternoon during a freezing cold winter Mrs Arnold got a phone message to say the carrier's cart was stuck on Red Hill and the horse was down. So she looked for Alfie as he came out of school to ask him if he could get the horse from the stable in Back Lane and take it over to Red Hill. The ever ready Alfie ran to ask me dad and then with a sack on the horses back he rode through the snow to the rescue. They were all still there on Red Hill when Alfie was put on the last tram from the terminus to catch the last train from Leicester to Sileby. Me mother greeted him with "You'll never go again - you'll never go again" but he did.

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


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This selection was done by my father, Ted Proffitt, who lives in Glasgow. They are much harder than the ones in the last edition and he has done over 250 of them!

#### HORACE YATES - 100 YEARS OLD ON 22nd MARCH 1994

We would like to thank Horace for spending time to write this article with his son and daughter-in-law, Brian and Sue Yates:-

I have spent all my life in Sileby, except for Army Service in the First World War. I was born on 22nd March 1894 in Angel Yard, off Church Lane and went to school on Barrow Road, where the Old School Restaurant is now. Mr Skelton was the headmaster at the time. Before going to school in the morning I used to take breakfast to the men working at the Brickyard on Albion Road.

I left school at thirteen and began to work for Mr Gamble, the local carrier, who lived behind the church where Mr Wilf Preston now lives. He had a crippled son and I used to take him to Leicester with me on Saturdays. His father gave me 4d for a mug of tea and a cake and to bring his son a tin of tea and a cake. He used to get more tea because it was in his own tin!

When I was fifteen I got a job at Sharpes' Brewery in the High Street, working

in the bottle stores for three years and then I started doing the delivering round the county to public and private houses with horses and drays. One of my worst days at work was going to Earl Shilton on a very bad day - a lot of snow about and freezing I had my horse frost nailed and left at 6.30am. I had to go to a farm and get them to bring a horse to give me a pull up Shoulder of Mutton Hill in Shilton. We got back to Sileby about 10.30pm. The next morning when I was a quarter of an hour late the foreman asked me where I had been - He didn't ask me where I was the night before, so I though it best to give him dummy as I didn't want to lose my job. The Brewery then had the first steam driven lorry in the village in 1912 and I went on to drive that.

When the First World War (1914-18) broke out I was put in the Royal Army Service Corps because I was a driver. I served in France as a Caterpillar driver, taking the guns up to the front.

In March 1918 I was married to Beatrice Lovett by the Reverend Burrows at St Marys Church. We had three sons Horace, Les and Brian and we went to live along Cossington Road in 1924, where I still reside. There was very little work about in the early 30's and my wife had an 8 acre field left to her by her father, Mr Israel Lovett, so we bought two milking cows at a farm sale at Barkby for £20 and £25 each and started selling milk around the village at 2d a pint from churns and buckets. Gradually we bought a few more fields, bred and bought a nice little milking herd and continued to deliver it round the village by pony and float until 1948 when we sold the round and continued to wholesale the milk to the dairy.

My hobbies were playing long alley skittles for the Constitutional Club, following Sileby Vics and Town Football Clubs - Derby County was always my favourite professional football club. I remember the Vics going to Castle Donnington where they had to win to top the Loughborough League. When the Castle Donnington team played at Sileby they would say 'Wait 'til we get you under the clock'. When we got there they had put the leather football

in a bath of water to make it heavy. They were a big, strong side but Sileby won! On my way home the tyre on my bike burst at Loughborough so I had to walk the rest of the way home but with Sileby winning it didn't spoil the day.

How times have changed; when I was a young lad I used to take Mr Collington's cows from Quebec farm off Seagrave Road to graze the roadside verges all day for 6d - if you were lucky.

My friends used to be Bill Willars, Walter Hudson and Joe Walker, On Sunday evenings we would go to church, come out and walk over the slabs to the Bull and Mouth at Mountsorrel for a pint of best beer for 3d a pint and on winter nights it used to be down the Free Trade.

I have been very lucky to have a healthy life and live in Sileby where the people are so friendly and always ready to help. I have had a supportive family and would like to thank you all for your support and friendship throughout my life.

#### HILDA GIBBS - 100 YEARS OLD ON 4TH JANUARY 1994

As some of the older readers are kind enough to enquire about my Mother's welfare, it may be of interest to them to know that Hilda Gibbs, as she is still referred to, is alive and well. In fact she has just reached her 100th birthday, on 4th January.

My mother was born at the Old Vicarage, Mountsorrel and was one year old when my grandparents, Mr and Mrs Fred Gibbs moved to the family home 'Highbury', in Mountsorrel Lane, now a residential home. Two of her earliest memories were hearing grown-ups talking about the Boar War and actually seeing a motor car!

Her first school was Miss Hemsleys on Cossington Road - can anyone identify this, or is the house long gone? She qualified as a Doctor of Medicine in 1920 and worked in Edinburgh, Liverpool and elsewhere, but spent much of her time at Highbury until me grandparents left in 1953.

She and Elsie Martin ran the Sileby Girl Guides for a while, as I have later been reminded by members of the troop.

It is hard to imagine that any future group of old people will live through so many changes both worldwide and locally, as today's centenarians have.


It is interesting, as one goes about, to look at the houses in the village and realise how many - or rather how few - existed in 1894. Certainly they were rather cheaper:- The highest rent for a cottage in Mountsorrel Lane at this time was 12 shillings per month (or 60p for the benefit of the younger readers).

To those of you who can remember her, my mother sends you all her very best wishes.

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#### DOOR CHAINS - SAFETY FOR THE ELDERLY

For several years door safety chains have been available FREE from the Parish Council. They are easily fixed by any person with a small screwdriver - screws are supplied with the kit.

The only qualification to receive door chains is that you should be: (a) an old age pensioner, and/or (b) disabled or elderly and living alone. (For further information please contact Beverley Burton, Clerk to the Parish Council, tel. 813075).

The chain should only be used when answering the door, slip the chain on, open the door to the extent of the chain, ask the visitor to identify himself/herself. If satisfied, you can then close the door, release the chain and let your visitor in.

On no account should you keep the door chain on all the time. This could lead to a difficult situation in case of accident or other emergency.

#### SILEBY STATION



Sileby station - it's wooden waiting room would be the only part readily visible to passengers passing through but this belied the intense activity which it embraced. An article in the Leicester Mercury in the mid 1930's described our village as "the industrial pivot of North

Leicestershire" as it indeed was.

There were ten shoe factories reputed to produce between them in excess of 40,000 pairs per week, a sizable hosiery industry, wallpaper factory and the malthouse in High Street from which emanated the distinct aroma, delicious from a distance but not so described by residents in the village centre.



The Sherrat family of hauliers collected the factory output every day. Cartons were piled high on barrows of both platforms awaiting trains about 5.00pm. One of the duties of the Station Master was to visit each factory once a month to collect the freight charges. Times have changed.... A special football train was a feature of Saturday and was filled to capacity whenever Leicester City had a home match. This was followed by a shopping train. We all worked a 5½ day week in those days and Saturday afternoon was the only opportunity to make our purchases in Leicester.

Then came the war years; and nationalisation in the post war period, but the steam locomotives were still retained for some time. I was working in Leicester then and our train was famous (or infamous) for the knitting activity of it's female passengers. Many a jumper or cardigan owed most of it's creation to the journey between Sileby and Leicester. We cannot have been the only ones to employ so diligently, for a letter appeared in a national newspaper, written by some disgruntled male from another area, who recommended that girls who knitted in trains should be consigned to a separate compartment marked PESTS.

Did this deter us? Certainly not! Profitable activity was not confined to the female sex, two gentlemen who probably boarded the train in Nottingham did the Daily Telegraph crossword each day and apparently completed it shortly before the train reached Leicester.

Eventually the steam trains gave way to diesel 3-car sets and the journey time reduced to 11 minutes. The return journey in the evening though could only adhere to this time by courtesy of the all important express train to Manchester for which our train was the local connection. The lateness of the Manchester train was all too frequent and at times it was decided to let our train go first, and hopefully get it out of the way. Sometimes this worked, but usually didn't; once through Syston we were deposited somewhere on the Peterborough line until the Manchester train had passed. Worse still, we were then often caught out by a southbound train from Leeds, also exercising it's priority. Eventually we would get back on our proper line and at some time reach Sileby.



Disaster loomed in the early 1960's, some stations were down for closure, but surely not Sileby, situated as it was on a main line and serving a large village. Matters came to a head at the Rail Tribunal in May 1965. Ably supported by the Barrow-upon-Soar R.D.C. we

made our protests both at village level and as individuals. A survey on the 8.05am to Leicester over a period of four weeks produced the figures of not less than 56 nor more than 69 persons boarding that particular train at Sileby.

To our delight the inspector ruled in our favour and the station remained open, but alas, officialdom won eventually and this second time there was no reprieve. Letters and comments still in my possession read like a prophecy. Ordinary people could envisage the ultimate outcome but closure was apparently a foregone conclusion and those who made the decision refused to listen; the station closed in March 1968. It was claimed at the time that British Rail would save £114,000 from this action which took in most of the local stations between Birmingham and Nottingham. One wonders if this saving was ever realised? A remark constantly aired at the time was that if Mr Beeching and "they" in the government had to cope with the 'bus journey' the station would have remained open. We had our own ideas on where we would have yielded the axe. The first 'bus' on which I travelled to work had obviously been put into service hurriedly from the Worcester area, for it bore a notice from the local Samaritans "If you are in despair and have come to the end of the road then ring this number". This seemed to sum up the feelings of most passengers that day and this exercise in technical advancement increased fares by nearly 70% and travelling time by 500% in my particular case.

Revisions over the years have certainly reduced 'bus travelling time' to a more acceptable level.

I still have my last train ticket, dated 1st March 1968, Sileby to Leicester Return, cost 3s 6d (17½p). The station closed two days later.

Something more than the train service was lost from our village on that fateful day.

For the benefit of people not familiar with it, the station booking office was a brick building situated just off the pathway between the cast iron railway bridge and the main entrance to the present-day car park.



The station yard formed a square, cobbled in parts, with a 'jitty' going down to Brook Street. The rail level is some height above it - so in order to gain the 'up' platform for trains to Leicester, one had to climbed up some stone steps situated under the bridge. From here you had a splendid view of the village. The waiting room was a long wooden building consisting of an ordinary waiting room and next to this was a ladies room. The windows of the building were always brown and remained so no matter how hard you rubbed at them. This was due to fumes coming from Plunketts Brewery in the High Street. This building is now known as The Maltings. I close my eyes, and, sure enough, I get the aroma of roasting malt - not unpleasant - oh happy days! The 'down' platform to Loughborough was gained by a long steep slope. In the fifties, Rolls Royce aero engines were brought to the station in big wooden crates by road. These had to be unloaded on to the station barrows and pushed up the slope by a porter and two junior porters, me being one of them. Sometimes we even had to call on the assistance of the booking clerks. The building on this platform was a more grand affair - with the ladies room equipped with plush seating, ordinary waiting room and Station Masters office. Mister Flint, the Station Master, never used this office, preferring to base himself in the booking office, where he could keep an eye on 'them young lads' as he used to call us.

Attached to the station was the goods yard (now the Highbridge estate) which consisted of several coal yards, a weighbridge and other lines, not forgetting the goods shed. Two slow freight trains called daily, which gives you some idea of how busy it was. The trains brought empty wagons for Plunkett's malt, loaded coal wagons and 'sack' wagons. These carried large agricultural sacks from where else - but SAXBY!

Can you people out there remember the horse and cart stopping at your door at holiday times to pick up your luggage, convey it by train to your holiday destination and then deliver it to your digs? Not like today - having to lug it about or find a trolley, if you are lucky. Who remembers the big, green enamelled sign of a man riding a Raleigh Cycle attached to a massive wooden hoarding. This was on the opposite side of the road and nicely hid the porters room from view. The booking office was a very cosy place - large turtle stove in the centre, surrounded by desks, ticket racks and, the most important feature - mashing equipment! Many's a tale I could tell but I won't bore you good people any longer.


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#### CRUCIFIXION IN KING STREET

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#### SILEBY COMMUNITY CENTRE



Last December, I was invited by Leicestershire Rural Community Council to attend the presentation of prizes for 'The Best Village Hall' competition. Expecting the usual "Good try, better luck next time", runners-up prize, I was extremely pleased to receive on behalf of the committee the first prize of £100 for winners of 'The Best Large Village Hall in Leicestershire'.

Since the formation of a new committee twelve months ago, dedication by the members and supporting staff turned a three figure deficit in our accounts to a three figure credit, and this first prize award was the feather in our cap.

As you may be aware, since the agreement by the Parish Council to purchase the Community centre for £90,000, tedious negotiations have continued with Charnwood Parish Council to secure the ownership of the Hall as an asset to the village.

And yet I still hear subversive comments like "It wants knocking down", "Build a new one", "It's a white elephant", "A millstone the village doesn't want". But are these comments fair or simply unrealistic?

"Knock it down", is simple enough but it would cost around £40,000 to demolish the hall and the house, clear and secure the site. And what would you have to show for it? Nothing.

"Build a new one", good idea, but where? Show me another site of equal size, centrally placed to other village amenities, and what would the cost be? To buy the land and build a hall of equal size.....£500,000 - a figure far beyond our hard pressed pockets.

"White elephant", "A millstone, this village doesn't want".

A mandate from a public meeting gave the go ahead for the purchase of the Hall to secure it for the regular use of over 250 people each week together with numerous special occasions such as wedding receptions, parties, theatre productions, craft and jumble sales at reasonable hire rates. Comments like these only go to prove that not all dinosaurs became extinct from the Jurassic period.

It might be worthwhile reflecting on the inscription on the plaque from when the Community Centre was officially opened on 14th January 1978, "For the use and pleasure of the residents of Sileby". It is there for you to use, whenever you wish, tomorrow or anytime in the future. Remember, Sileby Community Centre is no ordinary hall. A first prize award proves that it is THE BEST LARGE VILLAGE HALL IN LEICESTERSHIRE.

#### THE BELLS OF SAINT MARY'S

Our local church has for centuries been famous for its bells and hence its enthusiastic bell-ringers (campanologists). The bells themselves comprise a peal of 10, which is large compared with other peals of bells in this county.

As may be expected they are of different weights and dates. These are as follows:-

Most of the bells have further inscriptions.

The old peal of five bells were rehung on a steel frame in 1934, the old oak frame being decayed and unsafe. The two bells were added in 1945. During World War II by Government decree there was no ringing, but ever since that time they have been rung regularly.

They are visited and rung frequently by ringing teams from all over the country who are happy to find such a fine peal of bells in such a small town.

The last major alteration was in the period 1978/83 when the peal was increased from eight to ten. The effort to pay for this gigantic task was made almost entirely by the enthusiastic ringers who made great efforts in collecting waste paper, scrap iron etc to raise money.

Thankfully much of the expensive bell metal was supplied by the gift of a redundant bell from Saint Gregory's Roman Catholic Church and also a bell from the unsafe and now demolished Bell tower at Sileby Cemetery, by courtesy of the Parish Council.

The team of ringers consists of ladies and men who meet regularly to practice and for Sunday services and weddings when requested.

#### Researching My Family Tree

This new hobby of mine started off as a birthday present from my father in the shape of a book with blank pages. Now the pages are starting to fill up. I started my research by questioning relatives, elderly aunts and uncles. After obtaining information on their date of birth and their children I started working backwards from the information supplied on their birth certificates to both sets of grandparents. So far I have been lucky enough to go back as far as 1756.

Having obtained as much information as possible from my family my next step was to search through the public records office which hold the records of all births, marriages and deaths in England and Wales since 1st July 1837.

Another way of obtaining the information I needed was to search through the telephone books. I came up with over 40 Easingwood families, from Scotland down to the south coast. I sat down and wrote to everyone of them asking for information on their families going as far back as they could remember. I have now received over a dozen letters and family trees from distant relatives that I had never heard of before and believe me I am getting so much enjoyment in researching the history of my family, and having an unusual surname made it much easier to trace. My family tree started off as a small sapling, it has now grown into a very big oak tree.

If anyone is interested in my family tree or would even like some information on how to research their own I would be willing to help. They can get my address from any member of The Stockade.

The children living at home in 1891 were Emma (18), my grandfather Wilfred Ward (16), Charles Henry (14), Percy G. (9), Clara M. (6) and Ada (3)."



#### ALONG THE LANE

From the thickest, tallest grasses weaving, winding through windrows and haycocks, the harsh, monotonous call of a corncrake could be heard calling from across the fields all day long.

The prickly gorse had lit it's yellow lamps long before the schoolboy, who's name was Derrycott had turned out his cattle to forage the wide grass verges for the first time in the year. His mother and he lived in a cottage at Pawdy Cross Roads. Her young husband, George had perished from exposure in blizzard conditions. To dig the grave in the quiet country churchyard it was first necessary to move five feet of snow.

Wondering, wandering along the wide grass verges that run parallel with the ruts made deep in the road by farm wagons and carts, to earn a few pence for his widowed mother, tented the kine. His only companions were the red and roan shorthorn milch cows that supplied milk to the local dairy to produce local cheese. He had no need for calender or clock. Sweet fragrance of new-mown hay marked the season of summer. Metallic rattle of a mechanical sheaf binder and stooks in rows straight and curved suggested longer, cooler nights. Cows with an in-built clock came home in time for his tea.

His music was the grasshopper singing in the grass, the buzz of the bumblebee speeding along gathering a golden harvest. His riches were drops of dew, more precious than any diamonds and pearls, the wild woodbine twining through leafy branches, drooping over the hedge, scenting the cool evening air and bright red berries and leaves glossy and green of the black bryony trailing over the hawthorn hedges. No garden cultivated plant can be more exotic. Dereasing light, the advancing year, turn summer into autumn. Slowly sauntering along, he would stop to pick and eat black, ripe fruit of the bramble.

Pausing with unquenchable desire for search and discovery, he peered among the trembling leaves on the poles at Craddock's Ashes. He knew well the ways of Hym. The natural instincts of she that tripped along the road so daintily, told her no harm will come to her. He is not a threat. From almost at his feet rabbits would scamper away. Butterflies fluttered from flower to flower. Blue skies; shining suns; drowsy odours of summer. "A very little bit of bread and no cheese".

In his heaven on the hill, through narrow lanes and drives, together with other boys who tended cows, he turned towards the village and home. He knew the hills and knew them well. Never did his feelings dwindle or fade for the days when he tented the cows.

"They call it tenting, not tending", said his son, another George, who has seen part of his family history written on calf skin. Gesticulating with extended arm above his head to indicate the hills. He said "And that is where the cowslips grew. Vast drifts of yellow blooms that dazzle the eye covered the slopes. And where have they all gone? That's what I would like to know".

#### RECIPE PAGE

#### Coffee Fudge

#### INGREDIENTS:

1 pint fresh milk 10oz sugar 4oz butter

2 tablespoons of coffee essence

#### METHOD:

- 1. Pour the milk into a heavy based saucepan and bring slowly to the boil. Add the sugar and butter. Heat slowly, stirring all the time until the sugar dissolves and the butter melts. Bring to the boil and simmer gently for 25 to 30 minutes, stirring occasionally.
- 2. Remove from the heat and stir in the coffee flavouring. Leave to cool for 5 minutes.
- 3. Transfer to a buttered 5 inch square tin. Mark into rectangles and cut up with a sharp knife when firm and set. Store in an airtight container. Silely Hall will also provide our re-

#### INGREDIENTS:

5oz margarine 4oz sugar 2 fluid oz golden syrup 9oz rolled oats

- 1. Warm the margarine and syrup together.
- 2. Put the oats and sugar in a bowl and mix together. Add the warmed margarine mixture and mix well.
  - 3. Press the mixture into a greased tin (Toffee type tin will do) about half an inch thick and bake in a moderate to hot oven gas 5 (190°C, 375°F) for 15 to 20 minutes or until slightly
  - 4. Leave to cool for about 5 minutes then portion whilst still warm.


