

THE GREGS

The article in the Summer Edition stimulated quite a bit of interest and further information has been provided by Mrs Freeman and Fig Smith.

Local housewife Mrs Carol-Anne Freeman could hardly believe her eyes when she read through the last edition of The Stockade, for there in black and white was one of her own articles written over twenty years ago! In those days she worked as a freelance journalist/television scriptwriter and wrote occasionally for the Leicester Mercury under the 'Mr Leicester' heading.

"I remember it well" said Carol-Anne. "My mother, Nora Sheehan, had been a fan of the Gregs band back in the 1930's. When she told me they were getting together after 30 years, off I went to interview Fig Smith. My copy was usually well down the page but that article was my first leader (the main story of the page) and I was paid the princely sum of £1.10s.0d! I felt quite touched that Mrs Oswin had kept the article all those years. Usually your work is very short-lived. It was a case of writing your article one day, getting it in print the next and then getting your fish and chips wrapped in it at the weekend! I thought it was lovely that someone had actually kept it."

And do you still write? "Professionally no, soon after that article was written I put my career on hold to nurse my father and never took it up again. In some ways though I don't think you ever quite lose the writing bug. It's a case of "once a scribbler always a scribbler" I guess, for I was Publicity Officer for Sileby St. John Ambulance at one time and at the moment I am Press Officer for Sileby Scout Group."

BRIAN CHRISTIE

It is with great sadness that we report on the death of Dr Brian Christie, who we remember very fondly. Our thoughts go out to Jean, his wife, and his three daughters at this time. Dr Christie made Sileby his home and worked extremely hard as the family doctor to many of us for a very long time, and even when his own health was poor he put his duties first. Many of you who were his patients and friends have your own memories and stories to tell - he will not be forgotten.

Dr Keith Dunbar writes:-

I first came to Sileby in 1982 to have a look around the village prior to applying for the vacant practice left by Dr Ahmad's death. The first person I met was Brian, and I immediately took a liking for him, with his genial warmth and gentle humour. He instantly made



me feel at ease, and from that beginning my affection for him grew over the years. He and Jean always made me feel welcome in their home, and when I was going through some difficult times of my own he was always kind and supportive. Although we were a generation apart, and I have no doubt that he often thought I was quite mad, with my ideas for modernising my practice, and my general approach to my work as a family doctor, I think he realised that I was doing my best to try and combine the best of his traditional style of family doctoring with the best of the new, and his good humoured tolerance meant that we could always get on well together. I do not recall a single incident where we argued or fell out, even though I know there were times when I probably gave him due cause. Of course he could be pretty dogmatic at times, and there were many occasions when I disagreed with him, and could perhaps have felt on the defensive, but somehow I never didhis manner was never threatening, always charming, always friendly.

I shall miss him.

and from Popsie Gilbert:-

Sileby has lost one of its best loved characters with the death in July of Dr Brian Christie. He came to Sileby in 1956 and after practising for 34 years, retired when he was 70 years old. When he first came to Sileby he was unmarried, but shortly afterwards he married Jean and they had three daughters Rachel, Madeleine and Sarah.

He was a native of Northern Ireland and his Irish brogue and sense of humour endeared him to Sileby people.

When he was younger and able he would run up the stairs whistling when he visited his patients, and many of his older ones will say that that was enough to make them feel better.

When he was seventy and retiring, the village arranged a social evening to mark the event. The organisers were unsure how well it would be attended. However it was soon apparent that the Community Centre's large hall would be full to overflowing. It was a joyful evening and the Doctor, who was normally a man who never sought the limelight, thoroughly enjoyed himself and managed to speak to everyone.

Dr Christie was a keen fisherman, fishing mainly in Derbyshire and often bringing home trout to eat or to give away.

He was also a member of the Soar Valley Rotary Club.

As at his retirement, St Marys Church was full for his funeral, with his family, friends and patients joining together to pay their last respects to a man who had earned the love and respect of the Sileby people.

WARTIME MEMORIES

I was born in Sileby where I spent some of my happiest days. At a very young age I was invited to join the George Haimes Accordion Band (Sileby Division). We would go around playing at various functions, garden parties etc. The atmosphere was electric, with everyone thoroughly enjoying themselves. Over the Highbridge (King Street) we had stationed a searchlight battery and my sister Hazel and I would take my accordion and entertain the boys. I still have their autographs. I recall at the time I could only play "When I grow too old to dream", "Red sails in the sunset" and "If you were the only girl in the world". We were invited back lots of times. I nearly forgot "The more I see you", which was very popular. Wonderful times, wonderful memories, never to be forgotten. Marvellous magazine, keep up the good work!

When I left school and went to work at Newbold and Burton, and met my late husband. We did all our courting walking around those fields. Enough of my reminiscing, lets get on with our walk. After taking my photos we carried on walking eventually coming to the road which leads up to Quebec Farm, turning right walking up to reach Seagrave Road. Turning right once again we carried on until we came to Jubilee Avenue then through the passage into Greedon reaching Ina's home where we had a most welcome cup of tea, after which I went home to St Mary's Road after a most enjoyable afternoon's walk, with a host of wonderful memories.

Increased crime is a national problem which affects us all. Don't sit back and be negative about the problem. Joining Neighbourhood Watch is a positive commitment to act against crime here in Sileby.

Neighbourhood Watch members are expected to be alert and respond to what is going on in their neighbourhood. You will not be expected to patrol streets or be vigilantes but simply work together as neighbours to look out for each other and each other's properties. For example, milk bottles left on the doorstep or a newspaper half pushed through a letter box can mean a neighbour has gone away and forgotten to cancel a regular order, or it can mean someone living alone needs help or attention. These kinds of signs attract criminals. However, if you notice them and respond, you can save a lot of heartache and expense ... and one day your neighbour could do the same for you.

Many members have agreed that Neighbourhood Watch has brought back a community spirit in their area.

Sileby has a number of schemes at the moment which are working well but the ideal situation would be to completely cover the village. Each street of approximately 40 houses has a scheme coordinator who would be a resident of that street with a bit of time on their hands and would be the point of contact with the police. There are then about six contact persons who act as a link between individual households and the Coordinator. Any information from the police goes to the coordinator, to the contacts and to the households, and of course vice versa with information to the police.

MEMORIES OF D-DAY AND THOUGHTS OF AN OLD FRIEND, JESSIE

We met as school girls in Sileby, little knowing the way our paths would cross in the future years. We both became machinists at the Boot and Shoe factory in our flourishing village. War was declared, and as it spread local men were being called up. My two brothers were in the Army; one brother of Jessie's was in the Marines, and another in the Air Force.

The government had decided to register the women and after my being deferred for a year the familiar OHMS envelope arrived for me. I passed my medical A1, and not fancying munitions in some other town, I put down for the Forces hoping to make it to the WRENS.

Jessie and I both received our papers together, and at 12 noon on October 9th, we presented ourselves at Glen Parva Barracks. We had caught a train from Sileby to Leicester, had a quick look round Woolworths, and then by bus to the Barracks. I remember we were taken to a lunch of chips, fish and peas. After the usual medicals, injections and uniforms, we were taken to our billet - Hut 20 and double bunk beds. We decided to take alternative weeks on top bunk - but I always ended up on the top!

We transferred to Arbourfield after some weeks, and our 602 H.M.A.A. Bty was formed, then to Weybourne firing camp, then in December '42 to Belfast, Northern Ireland. Our final destination was Hayling Island, and our target German planes, with some success, for certain. We were training hard, we knew something was imminent, but not when.

On June 5th 1944 Jessie and I had evening leave, so as with most of the front line camps, we set off for the dance at Northey 3, a Naval base. As our bus turned the corner to the front the sight which met our eyes was something I shall never forget. Every inch of the sea was covered with small boats as far as the eye could see.

Together we said "it's started". Dance cancelled, troops despatched, tanks and lorries everywhere and back at barracks our orders sent Jessie as No 1 height finder and me to No 1 predictor operator. Our thoughts turned to all those we knew who were now involved. My husband (as he is now) with the 34th Amphibious Tank Regiment, Royal Marines, among them. It was quiet that night, none of the usual alarm bells urging us to pull battledress over our pyjamas and running, as we dressed, up to the command post.

We would watch, those nights, our planes heading for France with 5 or 6 gliders roped together and pulled by the planes. We cheered them on. On the fourth night we heard the motor-bike noise of the Doodle Bugs. We never knew how many we had destroyed, we only knew how tired we were, with little, or no sleep.

Jessie was posted to Kent, to Doodle Bug Alley, as it was known to us then. I was sent to Didcot, Royal Ordnance. I still meet our old A.T.S. friends from time to time, talking about our Ack-Ack days, about Jessie's friendliness with girls and gunners, her giggle and how when she was late we would take her mug of tea and bacon sandwich as we went on parade.

These memories are clear, as they are for the vast number of people who survived the last 50 years. Let us remember those who never got the chance.



SILEBY ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO

In 1894 Sileby, having over 300 inhabitants was required by law to set up it's first Parish Council. This Council took over the responsibility for the administration, making and keeping of local law (previously the responsibility of the Church, through it's annual Vestry meeting). The Parish Council consisted of Churchwardens, local officers such as Village Constables, Overseers of the Poor, Surveyors of the Highway and Assessors, and Collectors of Property & Income Tax.

The Income Tax was used by the Parish for poor relief, but the revenue collected by the Surveyors of the Highways through the annual letting of the grass verges for grazing was used as a most gruesome reward to the local farmers. The farmers sowed seed by hand, broadcasting it over their fields. This attracted sparrows which the farmers were encouraged to kill and then rewarded with a payment of one old half-penny for each sparrow's head.

The Charities formerly administered by the Vicar and Churchwardens, (except the Staveley which was purely a Church Charity) were also handed over to the new Parish Council for them to administer. The population of Sileby in 1891 census was 2,380, with 9 men as parish officers. (information supplied by J.H. Whittington)
