FEEDBACK

In this section we've printed your COMMENTS which have been prompted by articles in the 8th edition of the Stockade

PAGE 8:- MEMORABILIA, There is already a serialised history of Sileby in the form of a series of booklets called "Bygone Sileby". These were written and published by the late Vicar of Sileby, Rev. Raymond J Hunting. These excellent booklets are available for reference at Sileby Library.

The White Swan pub is probably the newest of Sileby's pubs; the deeds of this property would reveal some information on this.

PAGE 13:- Have you noticed the incorrect spelling of the council's sign at Cossington? They render it "Polly Pegs Lane", and not as Jack Meadows correctly wrote "Polly Peggs".

PAGE 33:- In Ethel Derry's article she mentions Mr Whyle's Post Office at the top of the High Street. This was the site of Sileby's first Post Office set up by Mr William Burgess, who was also a school master in the Church School. He taught six poor boys in the church tower with an endowment of six guineas per annum.

William Burgess was born in Sileby in 1792, and had a son also named William who became a frame-work knitter. William Burgess senior was part of a long line of successful teachers in Sileby. Frances Partridge, who died in 1654, had many pupils who went on to a university after having been taught by him in the Parish School held in the north-west corner of St. Mary's Church (site of present Ladies Vestry). This area was used for teaching purposes until 1776. The first school in Sileby was set up in the Parish Church in 1636.

The Post Office was originally set up after the introduction of the "Penny Post" by Rowland Hill in 1840. In a directory of 1849 William Burgess was described as being Schoolmaster, Parish Clerk and Postmaster. Letters arrived from Loughborough at 9am and despatched to Loughborough at 4.50pm. In 1871 Mr Smart was listed as sub postmaster in High Street. He was also a shop keeper and watch maker. He was followed by Geo. Collington who was succeeded by Mr John Wylde in the Post Office on the original High Street site. He produced a series of post card views of Sileby and Cossington and although rare there are still many in private collections. He died and was buried on August 3rd 1916 aged 76 years.

Mrs Pickard was quite a character. She seemed to be always dressed in long black garments, her shop was always 'a dump' yet she was quite up to date in calling it "Bon Marche".

The I.O.G.T. meetings were referred to: the junior branch was known as the "Sileby's Future" Juvenile Temple, and the senior branch as the "Sileby United" Lodge.

PAGE 34:- SILEBY AND COSSINGTON DIALECT WORDS.

The most interesting of Sileby dialect words was not included in the list from the Cossington History quoted. That word, the dialect word for LIAR, was pure Danish/Scandinavian, the translation of LIAR in Swedish at the present day is LIGGA. Those of us who were at school in the 1920-1939 period would readily recognise it's use in the playground and elsewhere if not in the "classroom". Here is a word introduced into the Sileby vocabulary by the Danish founders of our village before the English language was formed from a conglomeration of Anglo-Saxon, Norman, French, Latin and a sprinkling of other tongues. This word however survived over a thousand years into the mid 20th century.

PHYSIC HILL, HIGHFIELD ROAD, SILEBY

There won't be many newcomers to the village who have any idea where this is, but it will bring back memories to the natives!

This was a road beyond Albion Road. I well remember the brickyards with the warm kilns owned by the Wright family. My father, on holiday once in Skegness recognised their bricks piled up for building and said one could always own Sileby bricks because our clay was of prime quality.

After the brickyard on the right hand side there was a row of cottages (four I think) looking down the hill towards Sileby next a single house then allotments. Some of the ground is still being worked.

On the left side there was the clay pit then an orchard, more allotments and two houses (once owned by my grandpa of the General Sir John Moore). The road to the houses was Highfield Road and the area was known as Physic Hill.

The houses only had well water for drinking - I remember newts coming up in the bucket. The houses were demolished after being sold to the Brick Company who bought the brickyard.

My grandpa, father and husband all gardened 'up Physic'. I have fond memories of happy hours spent there and of the good quality vegetables, apples, damsons and large juicy plums. The air was sweet as wine. Perhaps this was the reason it was so named - Physic Hill - does anyone know? It is the name quoted on documents relating to the sale.

If this ground is developed will the names be used - Physic Hill and Highfield Road? I would like to think so.

FURTHER RECOLLECTIONS OF PHYSIC HILL

Having lived for over seventy years in Sileby I am still very interested in all that happens there and I think that the Stockade committee is doing a marvellous job in producing a very interesting magazine. Two articles in the Spring Edition have prompted me to write the following:-

Reading the article written by Joan Lovett of Rothley, I well remember the Albion brick works as I had to pass them every time I went into the village. I was born at Highfield Cottages, mostly referred to as up Albion Road. Going home meant going by the kilns which I watched with great interest as they were filled with clay bricks for baking (if that is the correct word). The fires all round the kilns were kept going for about three weeks. On a cold day it was lovely to stand there for a few minutes and get warm. After that time the fires burnt out and the kilns left to cool off before the bricks could be taken out. Further along were sheds where the bricks were made and it was very interesting to watch the men at work making them. This looked like very hard work.

Proceeding "up the hill" were three cottages and they had one washhouse and one tap between them. Going on still further was another house and the occupants of this house had to go to the tap at the three cottages for their drinking water. Then you went through the orchards to our house. Up Albion Road was often referred to as "up Physic Hill", where this name came from I have no idea, although a solicitor did tell my late brother-in-law that this name was actually on some deeds which he was holding for his client.

Although our drinking water had to be drawn from a very deep well, soft water was obtained by a pump in one of our outhouses. We had paraffin lamps and paraffin cookers with the only sanitation being a drain. In the summer time it was a lovely place to live, plenty of fresh air and lots of space. The apple blossom smelt beautiful. Winters of course were much harder.

The Orchards and ground there, as I remember, were mostly owned by the late Sam Barber, Mr Edwin Barber, Mr Alf Smith and Mr Blockley, who owned the house and grounds. Some of these grounds were rented by my father and by Mr Durham.

Now, Mrs Durham had a friend, Mrs Pickard, who was referred to in the article written by Ethel Derry. I remember Mrs Pickard and her shop and I often wondered whose job it was to empty the shop after her death and what became of all "the Stock". We always called the shop "The Bon Marche".

Mrs Pickard also attended the Wesleyan Methodist Chapel. I can see her now, dressed all in black, rather untidy (especially her hair), coming to the chapel wearing two pairs of gold rimmed glasses. Her left eye must have had something wrong with it as she always blacked it out by putting tissue paper between the eye and the glasses. The two houses where I lived have long since been demolished and the well filled in. So too were the other houses I have mentioned.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

DOG SIGNS - SILEBY MEMORIAL PARK

Sileby Parish Council continues to receive complaints from residents about the increasing problem of dog fouling on Sileby Memorial Park. As a first step to combat this nuisance, signs are to be erected at every entrance to the Park asking people in the interest of hygiene and health not to allow their dogs to foul the area.

We are seeking the public spirited support of the dog owners who use the Memorial Park to keep this area free from dog fouling for the benefit of all who enjoy the facility of the Memorial Park.

SUMMER PAINTING PROJECT - CHILDREN'S PLAY AREA

Following the success of the mural painting on the play area in 1992 it has been decided by the Parish Council that the project for 1993 will be the painting of the fence around the play area. The project will commence on the week beginning 19th July 1993. This is for children of the village and we look forward to seeing them again this year.

COMMUNITY CENTRE

Negotiations with the District Valuer have produced recommendations to both Charnwood Borough Council and Sileby Parish Council that the current realistic purchase price to the Parish Council would be £90,000.

This would include the adjacent house and all the facilities within the centre. This would appear to be a fair deal and it may be possible to repay the Borough Council over the next 5 or 10 years. Unfortunately we have not been able to obtain a final League table for the 1992 - 1993 season so if anyone can furnish the Stockade with one we will print it in the next edition.






CRYPTIC COMMENTS FOR MOTORISTS AND CYCLISTS

Can I through your magazine make the following comments:-

- The yellow lines around the village are not the remains of some ancient rite or left over from Christmas they do have some significance in law and should not be ignored.
- 2) The above also applies to the Zig Zag lines near the crossing in the High Street.
- 3) The raised edges to either side of the road are KERBS. These denote the start of the pavement this is an area for walking on, not for motorists to park.
- 4) The pavement mentioned in item 3 is for use by pedestrians and for people with pushchairs and prams. They are not cycle lanes We do not have such things in the village.

I hope this helps to clarify some points which appear to cause certain motorists and cyclists difficulty and confusion!





BYGONE SILEBY

We were pleased to receive several letters in response to our request for people's recollections of bygone Sileby.

A SILEBY COMPOSER: MR "TRICKER" PRESTON.

A complimentary benefit concert on behalf of Mr T. Preston was given by the members of the Town Band, in the National School Rooms on Barrow Road (now The Old School Restaurant) on November 6th 1911. Mr W.H. Sharpe presided and in the course of a short speech set forth Mr Preston's musical attainments and the help he had given to the cause of the charity during his life.

As a youth, Mr Preston spent 5 years in the Leicester Militia Band under Mr Nicholson, who pronounced him a "little Wonder".

When he returned to Sileby Mr Preston joined The Quorn and Sileby Town Band as it was then called, later becoming a member of The Sileby Town Band, to which he belonged for some 30 years.

Mr Preston was also known as a composer, his anthem "The Lord is My Shepherd" obtained a first prize in a competition open to all England. He took a second prize for "Trustfulness" and several of his anthems, including "Great and Glorious" and "Arise and Shine" have been purchased and published in the "Yorkshire Choralist". Ten of his glees have also appeared in print.

I remember hearing some of these glees being sung by a quartet from the King Street Methodist Choir, Les Spence, Ivy and Stan Dakin, Lillian Hetterly. I can only remember one title "The Hunt", can any other reader remember the other titles?

Before the shop at the top of the High Street became Pet Supplies it was a cut price shop selling all sorts of things like toiletries, household goods and gifts. It was owned by Cliff Howard who lived in Cossington and I worked for him. We were there for about 18 months to 2 years and then we moved down to what is now the furniture shop. It was a big two floor supermarket selling almost anything you could think of. I spent 6 years working there. At one stage Mr Howard appeared on television as he was selling cut price medicine products. I remember a lot of arguments and letters going back and forth between the drug companies and Mr Howard. As usual the big companies won and we had to comply with their prices. I wonder how many people remember?

CHARNWOOD BOROUGH COUNCIL'S LOCAL STRUCTURE PLAN

In the last edition of the Stockade we informed you about the latest Local Plan which has been submitted by the planners at Charnwood Borough Council. Within the boundary of Sileby three developments, totalling 370 dwellings, have been proposed plus a large industrial unit around Slash Lane. Some of the residents of Cossington have formed an action group, C.I.D. (Cossington In Danger), to fight the proposal for their village which involves the building of a new settlement of up to 1500 dwellings and a business park with local amenities.

We should be pleased to hear your views, for or against, on the proposed sites in Sileby and Cossington.

The following article has been submitted by C.I.D.:-

COSSINGTON IN DANGER, BUT WHAT ABOUT SILEBY?

The plans which have been suggested in Charnwood Borough Council's latest Local Plan, include a proposal for a large development of 1500 homes. If such plans go forward the development would overlook and take away the rurality of both Cossington and Sileby - not forgetting Ratcliffe, East Goscote and to some extent Syston.

How can planners suggest this site, which is only half a mile away from the Sileby site which was proposed in the last Borough Local Plan? S.O.S. successfully won their case against this original site at an expensive public enquiry only two years ago.

The latest news we have from the Planning Department at Charnwood is that each site is being looked at in more detail. There will be another round of technical assessments and in particular in Sileby the highway issues will be reviewed at greater length.

In July the Planners will report back with their latest findings to the Borough Councillors who will decide which sites will remain in the Local Plan. It is quite likely that all sites will remain in the plan at this stage and the public will be asked to express their views in writing during the public consultation period.




SILEBY JUNIORS FOOTBALL TEAM

The scheme has the backing of the licensees, the police and the breweries and can act as a deterrent to troublemakers. It adds to increased co-operation between the licence trade and the police and hopefully lessens the incidents of damage and public order offenses.

Details of any incidents or any problems likely to arise are passed on to each of the licensees very quickly making it easier for them to act upon it. It is worth bearing in mind that an exclusion order can be applied for and a person could be banned from all the participating pubs in the scheme for:-

- 1) Using violence or threats to the licensee, his family or staff.
- 2) Causing criminal damage to or in the premises or grounds.
- 3) Habitually causing trouble or disorder.

Hopefully the scheme will help to keep trouble out of Sileby which will benefit all - the licensees, the customers and the Police.

DUDLEY COURT SOCIAL AND FRIENDSHIP COMMITTEE

Dudley Court is Sheltered Accommodation for Senior Citizens and was opened by Mr. Francis Burton J.P. on September 27th 1973. The complex of thirty five flats includes twenty five single flats, seven double plus the Wardens accommodation, a communal lounge, kitchen, laundry and some store rooms. Recently, we had a very efficient fire and smoke alarm system installed. There are also four flats in the annex.

The accommodation at Dudley Court gives single and married senior citizens their own flat, life style and independence but with the security and peace of mind of knowing there is a resident warden who is available to the residents over the full 24 hour period and able to cope with any emergency that may arise.

In June 1992 Mrs R.V. Gray became the Resident Warden for Dudley Court and the Social and Friendship Committee was formed. Our first aim was to raise funds for a television and video for Dudley Court. An appeal letter was sent to various sections of the community regarding this and the response was fantastic. Substantial donations were received from Mr J. Astill and the Sileby Parade and Gala Committee. The Sileby Conservative Club and Mrs Kay Machin organised a Skittles and supper evening and all the proceeds went towards our appeal.

Other events organised have included two rummage sales and Wednesday coffee mornings, when everyone from the village is welcome to attend. Residents also enjoy one evening a week of bingo. A social get together evening was arranged and each resident was able to invite a guest. Also we had an enjoyable Halloween social evening. Christmas dinner for all residents was catered for and we had a Christmas Night party with buffet supper and refreshments to which we invited guests. Also a volunteers evening get together was arranged and together with a very enjoyable Valentines social evening! These evenings are very popular with both the residents and their friends and families.

The committee are in the process of organising other events for the residents during this year. The proceeds of these events are used to help and subsidise other events and outings. Three whist drives have been held and this will be a regular event to be held every month.


LET THE TRAIN TAKE THE STRAIN - IT'S GREEN LIGHTS ALL THE WAY FOR SILEBY'S STATION -


You may recall in the last edition of the Stockade we printed an article by Peter Garrood, the Ivanhoe Line Project Manager for Leicestershire County Council. Since the article was printed Sileby Parish Council have met with Mr Garrood to discuss the plans for our station.

We are all very excited about the Ivanhoe line and have been assured that everything is underway to commence service between Leicester and Loughborough in May 1994. The plan is that construction of Sileby station will begin in September/October with work taking place throughout the winter. Completion is expected in April 1994 which will give a few weeks for the Railway inspectorate to do the safety checks.

The service will be hourly in both directions starting at about 6.30am with the last train leaving Leicester no earlier that 10.30pm. Obviously the timetable may be altered when the County Council see the actual pattern of travel. To begin with the rolling-stock will be rented but it is intended that shortly after the commencement of service Leicestershire will purchase it's own trains which will be painted in distinctive colours to give the Ivanhoe Line a professional corporate image. Mr Garrood has assured us that although they are aiming at a high standard profile for the line, the fares will be competetive with the bus fares even though a small surcharge will be necessary for what he believes will be a superior public transport service.


Sileby station will be situated at its original position, off King Street.





There will not be a ticket office but there will be two shelters, one on each platform. The Ivanhoe line will be separated from the Intercity Line by a high fence for the safety of waiting passengers.

A WALK THROUGH SILEBY AND COSSINGTON

The walk we've written out below is quite possible to do during a summer evening. It follows part of the same route of the other walk we've put in issue 1 and the inclusion of a map should enable more of you to enjoy a walk. There are several things to look out for on your way round, so up you get - Please remember to follow the Country Code and wear sensible shoes or walking boots.

Starting from Sileby High Street head towards Cossington along Cossington Road. Before crossing Dudley's Bridge look at the inscribed date on the bridge. This is shown in Roman Numerals but is based on the Jewish Calendar. On your way along Cossington Road look at the different types of houses- The dates and names give you a good picture as to how this road in Sileby was gradually developed.

About 1/2 a mile along the road, opposite Charles Street, turn right along the public footpath along Kimber's drive. Cross the stile, walking along the path going between the greenhouses and stables. Cross another stile and you will be in an open field. Follow the path to the far right of the field and just before crossing the stile look over to your right to see the field where gravel extraction is taking place. Continue your walk by going over this second stile and walk across the field to a third stile which will be straight ahead of you. This footpath is not shown on any O.S maps because it is a diverted footpath and for the foreseeable future this path must be used. It is likely that once the gravel extraction is completed the original footpath will be re-instated.

Our path continues through another three fields; you will see the spire of Cossington church in the distance. Follow this direction over another stile and walk along the clearly defined path with a new plantation of trees to the left hand side. It's worth spending a little time here to see how many species you can name.

There is a T junction of footpaths at this point, turn right and then after few yards along turn left going via a small bridge and stile over the brook. Walk straight ahead following the right hand hedge of the field - notice Cossington's old Rectory (now privately owned) on your left.

Cross over the stile in the far right corner of this field and over another small bridge into a large open field. Follow the path diagonally left to the gateway of another field. The footpath crosses the left hand edge of this field where you are likely to see horses. You are now in Platts Lane, turn left (or if you want a longer walk turn right and have a look around Cossington Lakes) and head towards the village. At the crossroads make a slight detour to the right and look at the pinfold - a small area just passed Chine House where stray animals used to be kept until their owners came to claim them. This was renovated in 1986. There is a seat here for those in need.

Retrace your steps to the crossroads turn right along Back lane. Walk straight ahead - do not follow the road bend - until you come to the field where the roses may be growing. Walk across about 20 yards to the main track (taking care if it has rained as the path can be very slippery). Turn left along this path and walk to the road. Cross the road and walk straight down Bennetts Lane for about 20 yards then take the path called Crab Tree Lane. Look for the date in the wall at the start of this lane. Continue along the path into the field and exit at Polly Peggs Stile - does she still walk at midnight? Turn right, back onto Cossington Road and head for home.

MEMORIES OF 'THE GENERAL SIR JOHN MOORE'

When I was a lad the pub's proper name was very rarely used, it was known to the locals as 'Dick Gambles' as Mr & Mrs Dick Gamble kept it for years. They were Miss Grace Barbers grandparents. They also had another daughter who became Mrs Heggs and it was she who, along with her husband kept the 'Cons' Club for many years. When the pub closed the front was divided into two, one half became Worthingtons the grocers the other half was Mrs Carter's Fish & Chip shop (later to be taken over by Clark Carvill). Worthingtons closed down and became the Betting Shop. If I remember rightly before Mrs Carter had the fish shop Colin Wells had a green grocers shop on the site. I also remember that most Saturday evenings we had stalls in the front. These stall holders came from Leicester, on horse drawn vans. One week we would have hot peas and faggots, another week lino, rugs, carpets & oil cloth for covering your table, and another week there would be a pot sale. Old Ike Kidger would go around with his bell 'Town Cryer' shouting at the top of his voice on Saturday evenings "Pot sale tonight; the General Sir John Moore at 7 o'clock". It was never a Worthington house, that name was mistaken for the grocers shop by that name. It was "All Saints brewery"

BERT UNDERWOOD, SKEGNESS (FORMERLY OF SILEBY)

In request for news of 'The General Sir John Moore' pub, I cannot tell the history of the pub only our family connection and that General Sir John Moore commanded the British troops in Portugal in 1809 and was mortally wounded at Corunna.

My father, Wilfred Blockley, was born at the pub in 1888 as were his three sisters and two brothers. My grandparents, Lizzie and William Blockley came to Sileby from Blaby in their early twenties, no doubt just married, to keep the 'General Moore' (as it was always referred to in our family). They raised the six children and left the pub in about 1918 to live in King Street (where I was born and still live) - none of the family who lived at the pub is alive today.

One of the stories told was of tramps calling, being given food with their beer and sometimes put to bed - probably too drunk to leave as the pubs were open all day at that time. The bedding had to be fumigated because many of the tramps had fleas! My cousin says she remembers being told about a triangular vessel containing water placed on the top of the fire in which to warm the drinks and of floods so high in the pub that the pub was put out!

In the family there are still two pairs of sugar cutters and small pewter jugs. The jugs were for measuring spirits and the cutters used to cut off a small piece of sugar to put in a pennyworth of gin etc. Sugar was expensive and bought in a block like salt also used to be.

My earliest memories of the pub are of going with my mother on Friday nights to the 'Pot Sale' held on the square in front of the premises by, I think Lisemores of Leicester. One could buy crooks very cheaply and the patter was always fascinating. In the winter the site was lit by naphtha flares. Sometimes the sales man got so cross if sales were not going too well that he would smash some pots on the ground. His idea of sensationalism! Lisemores held a market stall in Leicester for many years.


