UPDATE ON A LOCAL PROBLEM

A new legal notice has been issued by Charnwood Borough Council Environmental Health Officers on a local poultry farm requiring that flies on the site do not cause nuisance to neighbouring villagers.

"The notice is a tactical shift by the Borough council in responding to the problem," said Matthew Holford, Environmental Protection Manager, "It simply states that the farm is required not to cause a nuisance. If a nuisance occurs in the future it will be for the farm to demonstrate that they have used the right fly control tactics at the right times if they are to avoid prosecution. We took advice from Graham Machin, a specialist environmental barrister when drafting the Notice to make it as watertight as the law will allow".

"We acknowledge that the task for controlling flies in this sort of farm is extremely difficult. There is no 'magic wand' method to get rid of flies because they become resistant to different treatments and so farm managers have to adapt and respond to changes in the fly population. It is a continual learning experience. The notice requires that they are totally on the ball or will have to face the legal consequences".

Half a dozen selected residents are continuing to collect daily information on fly numbers in the area for the Council. These residents were provided with fly papers with which to monitor the insects to help prove how fly numbers in Sileby and Seagrave compare with other locations and provide evidence for any further legal action.

Commenting on the results so far Mr Holford said, "So far this summer there seems to have been no more flies in Sileby or Seagrave than elsewhere. Nothing would please us more that to make sure that this continues".


A warm welcome is given to any newcomers when they join us.






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Information Needed


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HAPPY DAYS

The village had many little shops in those days where you could buy almost anything, from clothes, shoes, gifts, hardware, grocery, sweets and toys.

Most of us seemed to have one if not both parents working in one of the local factories, no shortage of jobs then, when the children would enjoy wonderful Christmas parties that were held in the factory canteen. We could play in the park freely, occasionally the big kids came along, which was a good time to go and play at jumping the brook, more often than not falling in. The swings, roundabouts, slides and American swing didn't seem to suffer vandalism then.

There was a cinema, now the chemist, where we queued and jostled for the three seats in the top left corner upstairs. We couldn't wait to be old enough to go

to the dances at Unity Hall where some of the older lads were beginning to form groups and playing the latest Rock and Roll. Many of us belonged to the Scouts and Guides; then there was the Boys Club, now Belgrave Wire. A few of us girls gradually joined in with the crowd and eventually, the Youth Club was formed, run by trained leaders, we had a great time, with lots of laughs. Who remembers Frankie Vaughan paying us a visit? There was basketball and football etc. We had a little coffee bar and could sit for hours chatting. We weren't allowed in the "café" on the Banks, the motorbike crowd went in there, it was always a mystery to us why not, and we never did work it all out.

The annual parade and Gala gave us a chance to enter a float and play the fool for a day. A gang of us entered one year as the Magic Roundabout. It was a good time for families to get together and catch up with friends.

After enjoying time together, there were always the chip shops to round off the evening – a shilling mix with scratchings – those were the days. I wonder how many of you still in Sileby look back fondly of those times. There may be some that receive talk@Sileby residing elsewhere who do. The shape of Sileby may be changing but I hope the spirits of its residents will always remain the same.

Wearing full, traditional dress of the Hindu woman for a night and attending a Goan Trance Party in the forest on the night of the full moon all combined to make the trip a memorable one.

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Changes and Development in Sileby

Dear Editor

I am writing in response to the Editor's request for letters on changes and development in Sileby.

I have only lived in Sileby for two years so I consider my views to be objective, based on the current and future state of the village. However, I am sure that other people will think that my opinions lack a consideration of the history and heritage of Sileby. That view is understandable but I believe that we should be realistic about the prospects of what can be achieved in the modern economic climate.

Talking to Sileby born-and-bred folk my impression is that there is a disappointment that the factories are being demolished and replaced with houses. My view is that demolition of the redundant factories is inevitable and is good for Sileby. I must stress here that it is only the redundant factories that need to be replaced. Factories or units that actively employ people should not be removed and are a benefit to the village.

Before I moved to Sileby I had some good nights out here in the pubs. However, my impression of the village was that although it was friendly it was not an attractive place to live.

My wife and I have settled in to Sileby life and would not want to live anywhere else but when I walk around Sileby I see what is in the village and the potential for what the village might be like. Sileby has changed and will continue to change. The large factories are part of Sileby's past. In some areas factories replaced houses and now houses are replacing the factories. The change is going full circle which is a natural part of village evolution. We must accept that change is inevitable but not always what we would like to see. Sileby used to have a cinema but I do not image that anyone would hope that we could again see a cinema in the village.

Does Sileby really want more industry and does industry want to come to Sileby? Would more factories mean more employment in the village or would it just mean more traffic? I have been stopped by articulated lorry drivers who have asked for directions. When they have found out that they are heading in the wrong direction they have had to turn around which is no easy feat in the narrow streets. Modern industry requires large economical premises with easy access to a transport network or cheap foreign labour. If Sileby had more factories we would have more juggernaughts regularly driving through the village and more noise and pollution. Yes, cars also bring noise and pollution but I think that it is less invasive than that associated with factories.

There is no point in keeping large areas of land ear-marked for commercial use in Sileby. If we wait for industry to move in to a derelict site we will be left waiting and waiting and the site will drag the village down.

Sileby has a bright future. There are plans to improve the park, traffic calming and improvements to the High Street will start in the autumn, Tesco Express will be open in the High Street by Christmas and we will have a 90 acre nature reserve in the near future. Replacement of the dilapidated factories is one of the pieces in the jigsaw to making Sileby one of those 'sought after areas' that estate agents are keen to describe.

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


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
