

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Homefield College, House & Liquorice Shop

It may come as a surprise to some of you to know that Sileby is home to a national specialist college. Homefield College, at 42 St Mary's Road, provides residential further education and training to young people with learning difficulties. Established in 1986, the college attracts students from all over the country, sponsored through the Learning & Skills Council which funds all post 16 education and training in England. From its small beginnings in 1986, catering for less than 10 students, the college now operates 5 houses in Sileby, which provide accommodation for current and former students.

Students usually come for 2-3 years, and work on a programme designed to meet their individual needs. Many students with special needs can continue their education in mainstream colleges. Homefield College caters specifically for those students whose needs cannot be met in a mainstream environment, but for some, a major aim of their course will be to enable them to access larger environments and more mainstream services.

Homefield College is a specialist college and is a member of the Association of National Specialist Colleges (NATSPEC – www.natspec.org.uk) whose college's provide for a range of students with a wide variety of learning difficulties and disabilities. The college is inspected in the same way as all colleges of Further Education, against national standards. In a recent inspection, the college was awarded a Grade 1, the highest award, for its "outstanding provision". Needless to say that staff and students alike were delighted to see the colleges being recognised nationally as a centre of excellence.

Homefield College students are complex and often have a number of additional needs associated with language, communication, sensory impairments or behavioural challenges. In recent years the college has increasingly provided for students who are on the autistic spectrum, and we have undertaken extensive staff training to enable us as an organisation to meet the individual needs of our students.

The college curriculum is focused on helping students to develop their independent living skills to enable them to become more self-reliant. In addition the college continues to develop students basic skills and where appropriate vocational options.

A major focus of our vocational work with the students has been through our retail venture, which we call "Liquorice", because it sells "all sorts!"

The Liquorice shop is an initiative whose overriding aim is to provide sheltered work experience opportunities for students at the college. It is a perfect environment in which to develop the skills, knowledge and understanding of shop work, and to provide practical opportunities to use basic skills such as money, counting and time. Most importantly however, is a vehicle to allow students to develop their social skills and appropriate

behaviour. In the process it is hoped to offer a range of interesting gift ideas as well as providing students with relevant work based learning.

Homefield College is one of only 60 specialist residential colleges in the country and Sileby has provided an ideal location in which the students can live and learn.

We recognise and appreciate the support and understanding shown to our students by customers to our shop and by the community in general.

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



What is the alleyway called between the Hobbs Wick and The Banks? Bushel Bridge.

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The end of season cricket match at Mill Lane, in aid of Rainbows Hospice, between "Ladies of Sileby Town Cricket Club" and "Ladies of the Free Trade" featured in the Leicester Mercury has prompted Mr. Harry Lovett, Vice-President of Leicestershire County Cricket Club. who gives talks to historical societies when they visit the County cricket ground, to tell us of a time when Sileby women cricketers had some unwelcome publicity in a Nottingham newspaper in 1833. "Last week at Sileby, the women so far forgot themselves as to enter a game of cricket, and by their deportment, as well as frequent applications to the tankard, they rendered themselves objects such as no husband. brother, parent or lover could contemplate with any degree of satisfaction" Mr. Lovett explained that the first mention of women playing cricket in the District was in 1792, when eleven girls of Rotherby beat eleven girls of Hoby at a time when there were only ten houses in Rotherby as compared to sixty in Hoby, "The players of the conquering party were immediately placed in a sort of triumphal cart preceded by music and flying streamers and thus conducted home by the youths of Rotherby amidst acclamations of a numerous group of pleased spectators.

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Seasons Greetings from Sileby Neighbourhood Watch!

Being a member of the scheme has many practical advantages. For example, you can feel secure knowing that your neighbours are always keeping an eye on your property. You can also get lower insurance premiums from some insurance companies. Many members agree the Neighbourhood Watch has brought back a community spirit in their area, with neighbours working together to organise social events. Neighbourhood Watch can be much more than an attempt to prevent burglaries. You and your neighbours can actually improve life in your community. Your are not expected to patrol streets or be vigilantes. In fact the scheme aims to avoid this sort of 'busybodying', but Watch members are expected to be alert and respond to what is going on in their neighbourhood. For example, milk bottles left on a doorstep, or a newspaper left half-pushed through a letterbox can mean your neighbour has gone on holiday and forgotten to cancel a regular order, or it can mean someone living alone needs help or attention. These kind of signs attract criminals. But if you notice them and respond, you can save a lot of heartache and expense. And one day your neighbour might do the same for you. Over 25% of Sileby dwellings are in Neighbourhood Watch schemes. If you would like to join or would just like to know more about us you can contact our village bobby PC 554 Steve Rhodes at Quorn Police Station.

A few tips around the home:

- Look as if you're in when you're out.
- Use time switches, to turn on lights, radios and other appliances.
- Don't tempt the thief. Keep valuables and Christmas presents out of sight.
- Don't advertise you are absent when away. Most burglars will only tackle empty houses.
- If you can, get a friend or neighbour to look after your home when you are away by collecting your post, drawing your curtains at night and generally making the place look lived in. And be prepared to do the same for them.

So pleased!

I was so pleased to see that Sileby has its own village newsletter again. During the seven years I lived in the village I was disappointed to see the loss of 'The Stockade'. It is important to have a common forum for exchanging news and views. I hope to be able to contribute on specific issues and read news and views for a long time to come.

Over the coming months I hope to be able to contribute to the debate about "where now for Sileby". I am the first to recognise that the village is going through tremendous change, but if approached in the right way change can be a force for good.

As I still attend St. Mary's church every Sunday and my wife is involved in running the Crusaders youth group, I get to hear a wide range of local opinions – from the old to the young. Yet I know from the amount of things I get to do in the village that it is simply wrong to say there is nothing to do. Yes there could be more, but it requires a bit of energy and enthusiasm from us all to provide them.

In response to my own village survey and talks with so many Sileby residents there are genuinely differing views about what sort of place is wanted. Clearly the main issues remain centred around the development of the village centre. What happens here will determine the character of the place.

But on top of this there are concerns about flooding, shopping, housing development, industrial development or the changing employment pattern. Recreation, sporting facilities and schools as well as local transport all need attention and fresh ideas. But Sileby is not alone. Other local villages have faced similar problems and we must learn from them.

The main thing I would say is to be positive and fight united – a lot can be achieved. I have always believed that local solutions should come from local people and not from outside. Most of the things that need doing will come from the local community itself and then from outside agencies like the Borough Council, the County Council and the Environment Agency to name a few. But you should lead.

I will be working with the final outcome of the Village Appraisal to help deliver the sort of Sileby you want to see. I think Sileby has always had far more potential that it ever gives itself credit for. By working hard with people who want to help, that potential can be realised.
