CHINE HOUSE VETERINARY HOSPITAL

A POTTED HISTORY

hine House Veterinary Hospital was established by Mr John Craven, who qualified in 1952 and opened his first surgery in Syston. He then moved on to Cossington in 1960. As the practice continued to grow, in 1970 he took on a partner Michael Minns (who has just retired in October 2002) followed by John Coope, Robin Kernohan and Conleth Hassett. Further expansion over the years led to the purchase of Sileby Hall in May 1994. Many people in the Village probably saw little change over the next few years to exterior of the building but as always Chine House and Sileby Hall was changing rapidly on the inside.

Sadly Mr Craven passed away in August 2000, however, his legendary veterinary ways live on in many peoples hearts. In October 2000 we completed our New Equine operating Theatre and called it "The John Craven Equine Unit" in his honour. The unit took about 5 months to complete and then just on completion the bad winds of October 2000 took down the stable roof and re-arranged the Equine Unit roof. Therefore, the opening was delayed until January 2001. A large crowd arrived to celebrate the opening. The unit has since proved itself and enables us to give our clients a good and efficient service. During October 2001 we undertook a refurbishment programme for Sileby Hall and now have 2 operating units for small animals as well. Therefore, the old Hall as it was has slowly undergone the

transformation into a modern Veterinary Practice. We achieved our hospital status in January 2002 and have not looked back since.

We employ 35 staff in total and some of those have lived in Sileby all of their lives. Obviously many of our clients live in Sileby as well. We have 7 vets who cover a wide area on their daily calls and 3 vets in the small animal department who are based on site unless required for an emergency home visit. We are a very busy practice and hope it will continue to grow. We do not intend to do any more changes internally or externally at the moment but who knows what the future will bring.

BRASS BANDS AND BANDSMEN IN SILEBY

Following the publication of the Band photograph in the last edition we thought you might like to know a little more about the history of Brass Bands and Bandsmen in Sileby

1888

The first Brass Band in Sileby was formed by the Primitive Methodist Chapel, it was named Sileby Temperance Band. Later when it was disbanded, it was reformed as the Sileby Imperial Silver Prize Band.

1910

On Friday May 20th 1910 at 1pm a memorial service to the late King Edward VII was held in St Mary's Church, at which the Sileby Town Band under Bandsmaster Clarke played Handal's Largo, Chopin's Funeral March.

On Saturday July 2nd, the Adults School's 3rd Annual Parade was held, the procession was accompanied by both the Town and Imperial Bands

1911

A complimentary benefit concert on behalf of Mr "Tricker" Preston was given by members of the Town Band, in the National Schoolroom on November 6th. Mr W H Sharpe presided and in the course of a short speech set forth Mr Preston's musical attainments and the help he had given to charity throughout his life. Mr Preston as a youth spent five years in the Leicester Militia Band under Mr Nicholson, who pronounced him a "living wonder". When he returned to Sileby he joined the Quorn & Sileby Band as it was then called. Later he became a member of the Sileby town Band, to which he belonged for some 30 years. Mr Preston, was also known as a composer and entered various competitions. His anthem "The Lord is my shepherd" obtained first prize in an All England Competition, he also took second prize for "Trustfulness". Several of his anthems including "Great & Glorious and Arise & Shine were purchased and published in the "Yorkshire Choralist" also 10 of his Glees have appeared in print.

1913

On Saturday July 27th the 6th annual Adult School Fancy Dress Parade was headed by the Imperial Band

1915

On Saturday 6th June the Sileby Corps of the Citizen's Training League had their first Church Parade headed by the Sileby Town Band. The same band played in a promenade concert near Dudley's Bridge on August 29th

1916

Saturday June 17th The Sileby Town Band headed the Adult School Fancy Dress Parade

1917

Sileby Town Band held a concert in Sileby

1925

The Imperial Band won the "Leicester Mail" Challenge Cup under their conductor Mr "Billy" Iliffe, and thus changed their name to The Sileby Imperial Silver Band.

1937


Sileby Town Silver Prize Band gained two first prizes in the Leicestershire Brass Band Association annual summer contest held in Nottingham. The conductor was Mr C Anderson and the prizes won were the Hawkes Challenge Cup and the Boosey Challenge Shield, both valued at £10

1939 - 45

Sileby Imperial Silver Band did not reform after the War.

1967

The Sileby Town Silver Prize Band disbanded



FRIENDS OF ST MARY'S CHURCH, SILEBY

The recently held Annual General Meeting of the Friends of St Mary' attended by 22 members heard from Iris Stevens on how well the renovation work to the church was progressing, thanks to funds raised through the Friend's events over the last year in particular.

The leaking roof to the North aisle has been repaired and work to the main Chancel roof is to start at the beginning of March. This work is costing in the region of £48,000.

Also at the meeting, John Burton, reported on the significant improvement to our funds in particular from individual donations, of which the Friends are extremely grateful; Eric Faulconbridge outlined the events undertaken through the committee over the year. Current membership stand at 71 individuals and couples, and this gives a sound base for progress. However, we are continually on the lookout for new members and ideas on how to raise funds.

Much more work has still to be done to the fabric of St Mary's Church especially to the tower and internal electrics. These are the next projects to be tackled, which will need in excess of £50,000 to complete.

ST GREGORY'S NEW SOCIAL CENTRE: Project Description

The hall behind St Gregory's church in Sileby had been there since 1924. the same building started life as a church in Leicester in 1882. By 2002 it reached the end of its useful life. Recently we had started calling the building 'St Gregory's Social Centre'; which has always been used more by the village than by the Catholic Parish, and its replacement being an enlargement and improvement, the community involvement may be very significantly further developed.

The centre has a substantial, well-qualified Management committee of nine people, and its affairs and accounts are independent of the sponsoring parish. It is a non-profit making self-financing body underpinned by the parish and ultimately the responsibility of the Nottingham Roman Catholic Diocesan Trustees, charity no 234064.

Total capital costs are £300,000, of which £225,000 comes from the parish and the difference of £75,000 has been obtained from the Community Fund.

Activities previously hosted included Bingo for the elderly, Sequence dancing on an excellent dance floor (which will be reused in the new building) Irish dancing, Mother and Toddler group, regular largescale shared table lunches and ecumenical course and youth activities. Activities being prepared for the new hall include: centre for Age Concern, retired/and or unemployed advice centre, luncheon club, possible provision for advice on substance abuse, CAB, Marriage Care, keep-fit/sports, provision for people with disabilities. Our estimate is that a dozen organisations will be providing upwards of 300 people of all ages with care or entertaining each week, with a particular bias towards disadvantaged people. There is a three-year development plan. The new main hall area is bigger that than the previous one (162%). There will also be a new linking utilities building with toilets, lobby and a very substantial kitchen.

There will be no paid employees. About 22 volunteer helpers will be provided with training as appropriate.

PLAY EQUIPMENT TO BE REFURBISHED

The Parish Council has placed orders for the refurbishment of the play equipment in the Memorial Park. It is envisaged that it will be ready for use at the beginning of May. A large piece of play equipment for the use of all abilities will be purchased as soon as grant monies become available, hopefully, this summer. The older children are to be provided

with a shelter, skateboard park/BMX track. They will be invited to be involved with the designs. The Parish Council is hopeful that it will be this year; again they are waiting for grant money to be made available. It is hoped that the teenagers themselves will police this area, as there will be no further money if vandalism occurs.

ileby Parish Council regularly receives complaints about the condition of public areas because of dog fouling. Dog Fouling is a health hazard and it is an offence under the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1966 not to clean up after your dog. - A SILEBY RESIDENT'S VIEW

Firstly, let me say congratulations to the Village appraisal group for their effort in production of the appraisal report, the presentations at the Community centre and setting up talk at Sileby.

The village model looks great, especially the open square which would be a real focus as the village centre. I realise that the model is not cast in stone and that the model is up for discussion. My only alternative thought is that the new road at the bottom of the railway embankment should be continuous from King St to Brook St. This would mean that traffic would use the village centre as a one-way gyratory system, which would reduce the number of dangerous junctions in the village centre. Also, the roads could be traffic calmed and the traffic would be forced to drive past all of the parking spaces. This would make the parking obvious so that there are no complaints about lack of parking and the parking should feel secure because it is not hidden

The proposed design of the park is also excellent. The scheme will cost a lot of money but would be very worthwhile. However, to try and reduce some the costs is the remodelling of the park adjacent to Highgate Road and the low level football pitch necessary.

On the down side I think the people of Sileby must accept that there will never be a swimming pool in Sileby. The estimated cost is over £1M while the Swimming Pool Fund has only raised £50,000. A new Swimming pool is proposed in Mountsorrel that is within two miles of Sileby Village Centre and will

have to be subsidised by the Council Tax Payers. I cannot envisage that there will be funding to build and maintain another pool in the Soar Valley.

But, to be more positive, what people in Sileby need is better access to the swimming pool in Mountsorrel, Firstly, there should be a direct bus service between Sileby and Mountsorrel. Secondly, I propose that a surfaced footpath and cyclepath should be constructed from Sileby Mill to the underpass under the A6 following the line of the footpaths. pathway should be illuminated and raised so that it is not subject to flooding. The path would proved a convenient, safe and pleasant access to the area that the leisure centre. I estimate the construction cost for such a path would be £300,000 (excluding land purchase costs). Sileby could part fund the project with the £50,000 from the Swimming Pool Fund. Charnwood are proposing to spend £90,000 on the path between Barrow and Quorn so we should be entitle to similar funding and there are probably grants available from a number of groups including Sustrans who are promoting and funding the national cycle network.

My final comment is that although the Appraisal Group is doing a fantastic amount of work voluntarily for the benefit of the village they are unelected and therefore unaccountable. At the launch of the appraisal Report the appraisal group stated that they would be responsible for the implementation of the aims of the report. I believe that although the Appraisal Group can work towards the aims of the report, ultimately the Parish Council must be responsible because they are elected.

Once again I offer my praise to everyone who has contributed to the production of the Appraisal Report which has made me optimistic that real improvements to Sileby can be made.

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
