ho's that person on patrol, we see him regularly, but what is his role, who does he work for and why is he here? Well, for those of you I haven't yet met, please let me explain.

My name is Brian Geeson and I am your Police Community Support Officer (PCSO) employed by the Leicestershire Constabulary and based at Quorn Police station.

The idea for PCSO's goes back to the Governments Police Reform Act (2002) which saw the introduction of PCSO's to work in local communities dealing with lower level criminal activities like antisocial behaviour and quality of life issues which may have a detrimental affect on all of us.

I am not a Police Officer, but I do have common law powers of arrest. I am authorised to issue fines for illegal



parking, public order offences, report untaxed vehicles and arrange with the DVLA to have vehicles clamped. I can arrange the removal of abandoned vehicles. I can confiscate tobacco and alcohol from underage youths.

My primary role is one of high visibility, giving reassurance against the fear of crime. I act as a deterrent against crime being committed and tackle community issues that a Police Officer wouldn't necessarily have time to deal with.

I am very keen to promote Neighbourhood Watch as it helps to keep people focused and aware of their surrounding area. It is important that people look out for their neighbours and report anything suspicious both to the Police and a local NHW co-ordinator.

It is imperative that we all look out for our senior citizens as they are particularly vulnerable to burglars who trick their way into homes. We must ensure that we always check for official ID from people who claim to be from local authorities, including the council, the gas, electric or water

companies and even the police. We should not let strangers into our homes unless we are totally happy that they are who they say they are.

I am very proud to serve your village. It is a good place to live and has a very good community spirit. I have got to know many of you and I thank you for your welcome and support.

Local Beat Officer, PC Tom Haines and I hold a Police Surgery at the Community Centre

in High Street on alternate Tuesdays between 10am and 11.30am. We can give advice on crime prevention, personal safety and Neighbourhood Watch schemes and are happy to listen to concerns and help with queries.

We hope local people will call in to let us know if we can be of assistance to them. I can even post code your treasured bicycle or any other property while you wait!

TO SCOOP OR NOT TO SCOOP?

Dog owners, do you clean up after your dog? If not, why not? Charnwood Borough Council receives numerous complaints about irresponsible dog owners who don't clean up after their dogs. There are very good reasons why all dog owners should do so.

Firstly, there's the law. The Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 makes it on offence to fail to clean up after your dog if it fouls on public land. A £50 fixed penalty ticket can be issued, or, if someone is found guilty in court, there is a maximum fine of £1000. "Everyone should carry a poop scoop when they take their dog out for a walk", said Environmental Health Technician, Hugh Weaver. He added, "forgetting to carry a poop scoop is no defence if your dog gets caught short whilst out for a walk"!

Charnwood's dog warden, John Barker, is in the front line against the foulers. "I put up dog fouling signs where the problem is particularly bad or where people have requested them", commented John, "recently in Sileby, someone even went to the trouble of removing a number of signs that I'd put up. They obviously didn't like the message"!

The law isn't the only reason people should "Scoop the Poop". Not only is dog mess smelly and unpleasant if you tread in it, cycle through it, or if you are unlucky enough to push a pushchair through it, it's a health hazard as well. If an unwormed dog makes a mess its faeces may contain the eggs of the roundworm "Toxacara" which can survive in the soil for several years. If they are ingested or inhaled by humans they may cause eye, liver, brain and respiratory problems such as asthma, hepatitis and epilepsy. Children playing in fouled recreation areas are most at risk, and dog waste is also a potential health risk to farmers livestock if dogs foul in their fields. "It's important to worm your dog regularly" said Hugh, "puppies may be born with "Toxacara" which is passed through their mothers milk, it's vital then that all pups are wormed regularly on the advice of a vet".



Sileby Town Cricket Club News

ill Lane, Sileby Town's home for well over 100 years, went through a huge transformation during the winter of 2003/2004 with the help of local traders and club members as the

changes to the old pavilion, which has stood since the 1960s, made the first step to making Sileby a force in local cricket once again. The refurbished pavilion still has a few finishing touches to be done and there are plans to set up a second ground on the far side of the existing Mill Lane site to allow more cricket than ever before to be played in the village. Club Secretary Alan Parker said: "A couple of years ago you could look out from the pavilion and the ground looked a picture. Unfortunately, it didn't look quite the same when you looked back from the other side of the field towards the pavilion.

"Last winter we took on a project to make the view all around Mill Lane look just as good no matter where you looked from. A whole host of people have to take a great deal of credit and it just underlines what a family club it is when you look down the list of club members that gave time and money towards the project.

"There was a bit of a rush to get everything done and dusted for the opening game of last season but the majority of the work we wanted to get done was completed on time and there were just a few loose ends left to tie up. Some of them still need to be completed. Things like varnishing the wooden interior in the function room and dressing rooms still need to be done but they are small things when you look at the bigger picture. It's definitely a good place to be on a hot summers' day - and the bar is always well stocked too!"

Not only do the club enter two sides in the Everards Leicestershire Senior League on a Saturday but they also enter two senior sides on a Sunday in the Grantham and Melton League and 2005 will also see Sileby enter two sides in the Loughborough Cricket Association Thursday Evening League to provide more junior cricketers with an early taste of senior cricket.

The need for the second ground has been brought to the fore by the continued success of Sileby's junior system, which keeps producing quality youngsters who will become the First XI stars of the future and in the very near future, the demand for senior cricket will soon be outstripping the supply if it wasn't for the second ground.

The First XI, under the leadership of James Melody, enjoyed a magnificent

second half to the 2004 season as they went unbeaten in the last nine games to finish a creditable fifth place in Everards Division One while the Second XI, skippered by Rob Hands, also finished fifth, and they did have a memorable away win against neighbours Barrow to look back on!

Unlike most local clubs, Sileby no longer play friendly cricket on a Sunday as the more competitive nature of the Grantham and Melton League helps the club groom lots of young hopefuls for the step up to Everards cricket. Grantham cricket has helped bring the likes of youngsters Liam Kinch, Charles Kindleysides and Phil Hackett the benefit of competitive cricket and they all went on to hold down regular places in the Saturday Second XI during 2004.

The Sunday First XI, under the captaincy of Steve Greenwell gained back-to-back promotions as they won the Second Division and will now play in the top flight in 2005 while Steve Steel's Sunday Second XI finished just outside the promotion places in Division Three.

The Under 13s produced a glut of silverware as they proved what a talented outfit they are with the likes of Michael Ruddle, Lewis Burnip, Dan Tompkins and Tom Granger producing quality performances alongside Kinch and Kindleysides as managers Nigel Kinch and Paul Tompkins guided their young charges expertly.

"The junior side of the club is our strength" added Parker. "We've got plenty of juniors and the new ground will give a great backdrop for them to parade their skills for both their junior side and the seniors. The club is definitely on the move but we are always on the lookout for new players and also helpers. "There's plenty of work that goes into a club like Sileby that a lot of people either don't know about or wouldn't think of. The tea ladies always do a fantastic job for the seniors and they're always appreciative of any help that anyone can give, whether it be in terms of physical or financial help. "We' do have a fundraising committee which is up and running and although we have club members on there, we'd welcome some input from the community in and around Sileby to bring in some new and fresh ideas. We've got a website www.silebytown.co.uk which carries all the club news and has also got contact details on there for myself and several other members."

The finishing touches will be made to the pavilion while on the playing side of things the first ball being bowled in anger is on 16th April when the Sunday First XI play their first Grantham League fixtures away from home with the Sunday Second XI kicking things off against Croxton Kerrial at Mill Lane the following day.

The Everards fixtures begin on 23rd April with the Firsts travelling to relegated Hinckley Town on the opening day while the Second XI have a home date with Hinckley's second string, who also dropped down a division. The important dates for the diary are the two Second XI fixtures against Barrow with a home date on 7th May and an away day on 16th July at Nottingham Road. Both promise to be highly competitive matches! Parker added: "We look forward to welcoming players and supporters to the club during the season and we hope to see plenty of people from the village out supporting their team and enjoying a few drinks in the sun in the process!"

The cricket club also boasts a ladies team, they are always looking for new players, younger or older, experienced or not to swell their numbers. All contact details are the Sileby town website – www.silebytown.co.uk A successful future on and off the field for Sileby Town? I'll drink to that!

Improvements at The Banks Surgery

As you may have noticed, there have been a great many changes at The Banks Surgery over recent months and so we thought it may be helpful if we explained what has been happening and why and also tell you of the future plans for the surgery.

In early 2004 there was a danger of the surgery being closed following the resignation of the last of the partners of the practice. This would have meant patients having no choice but to move elsewhere for medical care.

At this point Dr Clay and his team, who run a successful surgery themselves, stepped in at the request of Charnwood & North West Leicestershire Primary Care Trust. Their aim; to nurture a caring, stable, permanent team who would provide the best possible care for the patients of the surgery.

Many Improvements have been implemented already but many more exciting developments in the pipeline.

- Telephone Triage with Advanced Access has been a great success in many parts of the country providing same day appointments for those wishing to be seen and advice by telephone for those who don't. It also allows people to book ahead if they wish. We have now put this into practice at The Banks Surgery. The doctors or nurses talk to virtually everybody and book their appointments directly. The advantage of this is that many people (over 50%), have their queries or requests answered by speaking directly to a doctor or nurse without having to come in to the surgery. The doctors and nurses, therefore, have increased availability to see patients who want to come in for a face-to-face consultation and, because of their clinical knowledge, will allocate more time to spend with those people that need it. If you have difficulty in being called back then please tell the reception staff who initially take your call and they will do their best to put you through to a clinician directly when one becomes available.
- You may have noticed that the reception staff ask for a brief description of your problem when you call in. You do not have to tell them, of course, but doing so enables them to allocate your call to the correct person and also ensures that any urgent problems are dealt with sooner rather than later. One way that you can help us is to understand the demands put upon the surgery. Mondays or the day after a Bank Holiday are always the busiest and so if you have a routine query then it is best to avoid ringing on those days. Also it is worth knowing that 2/3 of all of our calls come in the morning and 2/3 of them before 10:30. So if you have a non-urgent problem or a routine query then the best time to call is after 2pm.
- Dr Alistair Moore and Dr Mick Summer came as permanent doctors in September 2004 and in mid-July they are being joined by a full-time lady doctor, Dr Clare Devine. Occasionally locum (temporary) GPs may be required to cover holidays, etc but we will do our best to minimise the number of times this happens.

- Sister Sarah Vale is a Specialist Nurse Practitioner providing specialist care for people with diabetes, asthma, coronary heart disease, hypertension (high blood pressure) and minor illnesses.
- We have just installed a brand new computer system to help us better care for you. This will help us to improve our record keeping and patient care.
- We have also invested in new equipment including a new computerised ECG machine, and new spirometer to help us care for people with heart and lung disease.
- Future plans include a new, larger surgery to provide additional and enhanced services with better parking.
- We are setting up a 'Friends of The Banks Surgery' patient group. The group will be your opportunity to input your thoughts and suggestions, to tell us what we are doing right, what we could do better and together come-up with ideas as to how we can improve the service that we deliver to the people of Sileby and the surrounding villages. This is your opportunity to get involved in helping to continually improve a vital community service and influence the way in which it is provided. Secondly, we are looking for people who have now or previously had particular illnesses or diseases that would be willing to help support other fellow patients who find themselves newly diagnosed with what can sometimes be daunting or frightening diagnoses.

Our first meeting will be on Thursday 9th June, 2005 at 2:15 pm at the surgery and will be attended by members of the doctor, nurse and administration teams. Together we can build a surgery that we are all proud of.

The young people of Sileby deserve to have somewhere to meet up with their mates and have a laugh and you as a parent would know that they are in a safe place.


