Local charity gets colourful make over with the help of volunteers

Staff from 3M Health Care and residents of the Leonard Cheshire Foundation joined together for a BBQ in the sunshine to celebrate an enjoyable week of volunteering by employees from the Loughborough-based company.



The modern purpose-built residential facility in Sileby provides supported living and nursing care for its 16 disabled residents. Last week a team of 3M volunteers swapped their suits and lab coats for painter's overalls to give the dining and kitchen area a new lick of paint, whilst another team tackled a garden makeover in the grounds of the facility.

The residents' large dining area now has a fresh, brightly coloured decor and empty flowerbeds and borders have been transformed into a mass of botanical colour.

The local Wyevale Garden Centre at Rothley assisted 3M Health Care in devising an interesting planting scheme, especially suited to disabled residents, and kindly contributed towards the cost of plants. Volunteers accompanied some of the Leonard Cheshire residents to the garden centre to choose pots and bedding plants for decorating their patio, whilst Sileby resident Anne French supplied some additional plants, fresh from her garden. After a busy week with the paint brush and some hard graft in the garden, the volunteers were invited to join residents for a lunchtime BBQ to see their hard work appreciated by everyone living and working at the Leonard Cheshire facility.

The volunteers were taking part in the company's 3M 4Good programme, which gives every permanent employee the chance to do one day of voluntary work during company time. "The dining room looks so much brighter and welcoming now and the garden is a fabulous transformation," said Sharron Pears, volunteer co-ordinator at the facility. "Our residents are already enjoying the new attractive environment, both inside and out.

"We would like to thank 3M Health Care for assisting us in the purchase of many of the new plants and the employees who so kindly volunteered their labour."

Among the decorators was Theresa Duggan, a training manager at 3M, and a resident of Sileby. "It's been really rewarding helping the Leonard Cheshire Unit which provides a valuable service for our local community" she said. "It was hard work, but the team spirit was high, and it is great to know that our efforts are making a difference."



SILEBY YOUTH CLUB

nce again Sileby Youth Club re-opened its doors on Wednesday 4th May. This was made possible due to a handful of volunteers who recognised that Sileby had nothing in the way of facilities to offer our young people. At 7 o'clock armed with some free soft drinks, crisps and chocolate donated by local shops and loads of optimism, 25-35 young people turned up. Black Thunder from Leicester Sound made an appearance for a photo –shoot and gave out some freebies. So far so good. During that first evening the young people were asked what they wanted from their youth club. The replies were varied, but the majority wanted reassurance that the club would stay open for more than just a few months, they wanted a relaxed atmosphere (less like school) and a few pieces of equipment for entertainment i.e., (pool, table tennis, play station, computers and a few games), a place to chill out and be with their friends. These comments were all noted and the list fulfilled. So Wednesday night was youth club night but only for 4 weeks. They wanted more! So now Wednesday 7-9 and Friday 7-10 became youth club nights. Membership had now reached an unbelievable 60 in only a few weeks with an age range of 10-18 year olds. But they still wanted more! So by mid June the youth club was open Monday 7-9, Wednesday 7-9 and Friday 7-10. Running the club has been a steep learning curve for some of us. Defining between acceptable and unacceptable behaviour, language and general attitude. This all came to a head in mid August when the actions of a small minority (& they know who they are) forced the volunteers to make the decision to close the youth club on Fridays until an improvement in behaviour and attitude was made. This has now happened and we are now at the stage of re-opening on Friday evenings again. There have of course been some highs as well as lows. A trip to Alton Towers on 12th August was a great day out (for some more than others), and during the school holidays we were able to take some of the younger members swimming. A sponsored football match against the army is in the pipeline as is a Christmas disco on December 16th at the community centre. The members of the youth club wrote a letter to Complete Wasters of the village, who sorted out a deal to supply the youth club with 5 more up-to-date computers, of which 3 are now running Broadband and with the other 2 to follow shortly all thanks to Bill McDowell for his help, patience and time. The members also wrote to Jelsons, who are to supply a sign with the art work on it being designed by Ben from the youth club. We have had 3 visits from the local constabulary, but only for social purposes, to wander round and have a chat, join in with a game of pool etc. We have also had 1 visit from the community support officer who had a quick look round to see what we have to offer and we have had a visit from the transport police who gave an informative talk on the dangers of the railway with it being in close proximity to the youth club. With all things considered, lack of funds and limited facilities, Sileby youth club is still open and hopefully will stay so for a long time to come. What has been achieved so far is all down to people giving up their own free time and energy, the understanding of the young people of Sileby for making the best of what is available and of course the patience and understanding of Pat who uses the same building to run the playschool every morning. All that's left to say is a big thank you to every one who has played a part in the Sileby youth club being re opened and remaining open.






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Illegal parking in Sileby.

The Highway Code states quite clearly that it is an offence to park on a double yellow line at anytime. You can park on a single yellow line but not between the times stated on the yellow no waiting sign on a post nearby. If however you are picking up or dropping someone off or you have a disabled permit you are allowed to park for a short time. With regards to a disability permit you are entitled to park for up to 3 hrs with the permit and clock correctly displayed. You can also park on yellow lines to load and unload bulky objects but it is helpful if it can be done as quickly as possible.

The law regarding parking on zigzags within the limits of a pedestrian crossing is that you just don't do it. It is potentially dangerous to pedestrians who are crossing at that time. Anyone found parking on these zigzags will receive a £60.00 fine and 3 points on their licence from the police.

The limited waiting bays on King Street and High Street are for parking for up to 40 minutes, then non return within 20 minutes. This applies Mon to Sun between 8am to 8pm.

The vast majority of motorists in the area understand the law and both respect and understand that without the guidelines our roads would be quite chaotic. So why is it that a small minority of motorists who agree that it is wrong to illegally park and to cause inconvenience to other motorists often do just that and illegally park. The main problem in Sileby is parking outside Natwest bank on Barrow Road. It has been this way for many years now. People park to use the bank or the ATM or just to post a letter. This can cause major problems for passing vehicles and vehicles turning out of Mountsorrel lane.

Another problem is caused when people park on the single yellow line outside Tesco's on High Street to either shop or use the ATM. The road is too narrow and holds up passing traffic. It isn't fair when certain motorists choose to park long term in the limited waiting bays between 8am to 8pm. These bays are for shoppers who just wish to quickly do their business and move on. Particularly helpful for people who find walking a problem sometimes.

Whilst I am on patrol outside either Natwest bank or Tesco's it is unlikely people will park their cars unless they are entitled to do so. As it is physically impossible to be there 24/7 so I rely on the courtesy and honesty of the motorist when I'm not around. I have to deal with so many other issues in my job other than parking, so I cannot concentrate on parking issues as a traffic warden could.

I can and will issue parking fines as I see fit if it will deter illegal parking but it will more likely improve if the public respect the parking laws and park correctly. After all we must think about keeping the roads safe and free flowing to help everyone in Sileby.

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NEWS OF THE REDEVELOMENT OF SILEBY METHODIST CHURCH

ost of you will have seen the for sale sign outside the school rooms in Swan street. Some of you might have heard what is going on, but for the rest of you read on.

In 2001 the church had its quinnquenial report. This highlighted problems, from simple decorating to a new heating system and roof problems, not one room did not have a problem and estimates for repairs were £50.000-£60,000. It was also realised that to meet the new disability access and facilities rules a number of changes were required to the building. The church council decided to appoint an architect to come up with an idea to modernise the church plus resolve all the access problems. After a while the plan was presented and it showed a very different church. The main change was the inside of the church was turned through 180' with the removal of the pews. The main entrance would be at the side into a new fover. A coffee lounge would be created together with a new kitchen. The existing main entrance would be replaced by an engraved glass panel with a small garden in front of it. This plan was accepted by the church council together with the cost of £310,000 and the decision to sell the school room to part fund the project. We then embarked on a major fund raising project. This has included pancake lunches, quiz nights, beetle drives, trips to Skegness, strawberry cream teas, bar-b-ques, a recipe book, containing recipes from famous people (some are still available at £3.50) together with the weekly village value and coffee morning on Thursdays. To help the funds we are to hold a gift day on 12th November, which will see a charity auction taking place at 2pm, where items no longer required in the church, including the pews and the organ, plus promises will be auctioned. It is

expected to start the project in the spring with completion in the autumn. Once completed we hope that the church will have more use by the community, such as parent and toddler group, lunch club, a centre for fair trade goods to name a few. Sileby Neighbourhood Watch

A burglary in your home is a cause of great distress to the whole household. In order to avoid such a thing happening to you or your neighbours here are a few facts to bear in mind. **Fact One**. Most burglars will visit a number of houses in the same area before selecting a target.

Fact Two. Visits will often involve knocking at a number of houses to find out if anyone is home.

Fact Three. While burglars are visiting houses to find a vulnerable target, they are open to being caught — but only if somebody calls the police.

If you go out, even for a short time, make sure all your ground floor windows and doors are securely shut and locked. When answering the door, always check the callers' identity—if in doubt, call the police. Do not let strangers into your house without proven identification. If you see somebody visiting a number of houses in your street and don't recognise them as a regular visitor, call the police. If you have a suspicious caller at your house, e.g. asking for somebody who doesn't live there, call the police. If you see anyone acting suspiciously and you think they are still in the area, contact the police by dialling 999. If they are no longer in the area, report it on Leicester (0116)22222222.

County Councillor's Report—Richard Shepherd

I should like to thank the Editor of "talk@Sileby" for giving me this opportunity to let readers know about some current topics and also know how they can contact me.

I was elected last May as the County Councillor for Sileby and The Wolds, and have been working with your other local representatives on the Borough and Parish Councils, and with County Council officers. Bus services and traffic management are among the subjects being considered. The environment and policing are also under discussion.

On specific points, it is hoped that a dropped kerb pedestrian crossing, adjacent to 11, Brook Street, will assist pedestrians, although I regret that at the time of writing I do not know the exact date on which this work will be done.

A survey of traffic speeds on Cossington Road has been carried out, and County officers are to consider what action might be appropriate. 30mph roundel markings have been added to roads at the entries to the 30mph speed limit in Sileby; these markings can only be used at an entry point to a 30mph limit, and so they cannot be used on Cossington Road.

The County Council has introduced Highway Patrols, a fleet of lorries to carry out routine highway safety inspections, minor repairs to roads and pavements and deal with local highway emergencies and defects more effectively. The Highway Patrol can be contacted by telephone using the Freephone Roadline Service number, 0800 62 62 03.

Issues are always developing. Please let me know of any matters which arise which affect you.

MR SMITH GOES WALKING

SUNDAY JANUARY 6TH 1980

First Sunday of a new decade. A milder day following a cold spell. However a rather cloudy damp and windy morning so did not tackle the Fosseway in the new year: to East Goscote only once more. Floods gone down in Broome Lane spinney, though river still high and muddy with one lone fisherman in sight. I do not see much wildlife in these parts though I see plenty of seagulls and rooks having a "field day" in water logged fields. I hear a "wuff wuff" overhead, look up and see half a dozen geese with their necks outstretched, flying in formation. No traffic jams or petrol fumes up there. Home again in just a slight drizzle.

It is now evening. I have on my paraffin heater and Aladdin lamp, giving me a room temperature of '63°', about right and much more comfortable than a stuffy central heating outfit with all draughts excluded. I am also lucky with having quiet neighbours (Ihave had some peculiar ones over the years). I have finished reading my "Observer" which keeps me in touch with what's going on in the world – about 70 years ago wise old Mrs Yates said "reading is the best thing a boy can do" how right she was! Anyone who cannot read must have his ears open all the time for "crumbs" from someone who can read. Old "Harry Flatface" said to a non-reader who was talking – "you know a bloody lot when you've been told."

SUNDAY JANUARY 13TH 1980

A fine sunny morning but very cold. Dry underfoot however and no 'icy patches' Started off a little earlier as I intended going up Fosseway this time. The county council are making a concrete curbed footpath on left hand side from "Barnets

Brook". This is just what is needed especially for me on Sunday! I suppose they will make it all the way to the fly-over: if they do I have fears for the old cheggy tree which is near the road already.

In this world of change, old friends must make way for things new. On to the Fosseway and the "fast lane" as it is called. There is nothing coming up behind me anyway, and I have only to look ahead for the overtaking fast ones. I reach Payne's spinney and not a rook in sight. I hope there will be no delayed building by bad weather and they get cracking soon in the tree tops. A lot of sheep in the next field. Lets hope the farmers are lucky with the lambing, with no snow or very little of it. No shelter in the hedgerows now for a p**s, which comes up more when it is cold. I nip through the gate where the old fox cover used to be and "have one" also a nip of brandy. Turn for Thrussington. "good morning nice morning" from a couple by their car at the gate, about to feed their horses in the field. I meet quite a lot of horse riders nowadays. Warm perhaps for their "asses" (as the yanks say) but surely cold for their feet.



ileby Town's season has been very much a case of what might have been for the senior sides while the juniors have shown them the way as their academy system produced yet more silverware for the Mill Lane trophy cabinet.



The First XI left it until late in the season to secure their Division One status thanks to a backs to the wall performance against the promotion chasing Langtons, where Phil Chamberlain's gutsy 70 got Sileby to maximum batting points and safety, where they had been reeling at 75

for 6 at one stage.

The season had started brightly but the loss of key players and inconsistency in both the batting and bowling stakes, coupled with some poor fielding in many games saw them failing to rack up the wins that many had hoped would be the case.

As it was, Jim Melody finished the season as the leading run scorer, with 573 runs at an average of 35.81, with Ben Cavey (421 @ 23.39) and the evergreen Nigel Kinch (336 @ 22.40) his closest challengers.

The bowling spoils went to pace ace Matt Ellis, who picked up 29 scalps in the league - with an amazing 21 of those being clean bowled, with Cavey (22) and Phil Chamberlain (21) close behind.

While the First XI were left looking over their shoulders for most of the season, the Second XI made a superb start to their campaign as they won four of their first five matches, including massive wins against Barrow and Bitteswell, before their form hit the rails, due to unavailability, before picking up again in the last third of the campaign, seeing them to a fourth placed finish.

The Bitteswell match produced fine performances all round from Sileby's young guns with Charles Kindleysides blasting his maiden senior ton and Liam Kinch and Tom Grainger taking vital wickets as Sileby won by 136 runs.

All three of those players represented Leicestershire at Under 14 County level, while Kinch became one of only two players from Leicestershire to make it into the Midlands representative sides, the other being Sileby colleague Michael Ruddle.

Phil Gleadell continued to be the mainstay of the batting with 389 runs in 13 innings', while Kinch, who also made his First XI debut, finished the term with 304 runs, including two half-centuries, and Kindleysides with 294, with a half-century to go with his Bitteswell ton. They were ably supported by Rob Hands (288), Andrew Preston (314) and Paul Tompkins (243) as Sileby's batting line-up proved to be one of the most consistent in Division Five.

Sileby's bowling was built around the reliable pair of Hands (37 victims) and seam bowler Dave King (31 victims) while the supporting cast of Mark Sharman, Nick Stone and Grainger gave their team-mates good cover.

Mentions should also go to youngsters Michael Ruddle, Daryl Hands and Joe Charity, who all made their Second XI debuts last term.

The Sunday First XI consolidated their place Grantham and Melton Division One in their debut season in that division. A century from Matt Willett kicked the season off well against the champions Pickwell but they were never really able to scale those heights again, although they did defeat Pickwell in two of their three matches. Buckminster were the eventual champions while Sileby finished in fifth place, a

creditable performance considering the number of Saturday matches they encountered. Michael Ruddle produced the seasons only five wicket haul, on his debut at North Luffenham, and claimed three further wickets in his other two outings. More of the same will be expected of him next season.

Again, Melody was the leading run scorer, with 333 runs in six knocks, with Willett finishing with 267 from eight and Pete Willcocks 247 from nine.

The Sunday Second XI saw further progression of Sileby's youngsters as Dan Tompkins and Lewis Burnip turned in regular performances for Steve Steel's side. Thirteen-year-old Burnip crashed his maiden senior half-century against Wakerley and Barrowden and then followed that up with a valuable 36 against Egerton Park and finished the season with 130 runs from six innings.

Craig Steel was the leading run scorer, with 296 runs, while the ageless Eric Hill produced fantastic performances behind the pegs, finishing the season with 18 victims, 14 of which came via stumpings, along with his 288 runs.

The bowling was shouldered by King and James Ruddle, with King claiming 33 wickets at an amazing average of 8.21. Ian Clarke returned from a lengthy retirement and produced some superb spells, without ever getting the wickets he deserved and he will be a key figure in helping develop the huge glut of youngsters that Sileby have in their ranks.

Young bowlers Andy Kenneth and James Headley made their debuts for the Sunday Second XI last term and they, and several of the other junior players, will be expected to step up to the plate next time around as they look to improve on their fifth place finish.

The Ladies XI enjoyed a slightly better season than previously as they completed six matches during the season and recorded two wins.

If the senior sides are to push for honours next season, they could do worse than take inspiration from the clubs junior section as the Under 13s racked up two more trophies and the Under 15s came close on two occasions, falling fowl of Loughborough Carillon Old Boys on both occasions.

Paul Tompkins' young charges walked away with the District League and County League titles, both with comprehensive wins over Loughborough Town, and also retained the Davis Cup with another comprehensive victory over Syston at Syston. They may also have progressed further in the cup competition had they not lost on wickets lost against Loughborough in the semi-final of the District Cup competition and that was only after making a stunning comeback from being one for two wickets down inside the first three overs.

There was further representative recognition with Joe Charity, Laurence Worn, Tompkins, Burnip, Phil Hackett, Adam Hackett and Sean Dudley all representing the North West District at various age groups while Stephen Prince, Andy Kenneth and Daryl Hands all went on to reach county honours, along with Michael Ruddle. Sileby's roots continue to grow with another good crop of youngsters waiting in the wings in the Kwik Cricket and Incrediball sections, who both enjoyed successful seasons.

Their numbers will be swelled again during the winter as Richard James and his army of coaches begin their winter coaching scheme on 16th October at Ratcliffe College as

While the seniors may have had mediocre seasons, the progression of the juniors has been superb and they have received their just rewards – next season will no doubt see many more of them putting in more regular appearances in the senior sides and pushing the club further on towards the Premier League.
