I think in the future the best thing for the village would be the introduction of a new bus service. THE FUTURE OF CHARNWOOD FOREST

Should Charnwood Forest become a 'Regional Park', as proposed in the Draft East Midlands Regional Plan, or are there other options for the protection of its special character and beauty? This was the question posed by a half-day conference organised by Leicestershire County Council on 'The Future of Charnwood Forest'. The conference brought together seventy people from a wide range of organisations to consider the issues affecting the Charnwood Forest area and discuss possible options for its future. Included among the delegates were representatives of the Friends of Charnwood Forest, the CPRE, Natural England, the Woodland Trust, the aggregates industry, the British Geological Survey, and parish and district councils. Delegates heard from Tony Squires, a local landscape historian, about the rich natural and cultural heritage of the Charnwood Forest area. In terms of wildlife alone, the area supports at least eighty-five species of breeding birds, all of the county's nine species of amphibians and reptiles and an impressive list of insects. Twenty-one of the spider species found in Leicestershire are found only within the Forest. Heather Broughton, Head of Environment and Heritage Services at Leicestershire County Council, covered the planning history of the Forest, which was at one time considered for designation as an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. Other speakers explained the pressures that Charnwood Forest is likely to face over the next twenty years, particularly for mineral working and housing, and the agricultural changes that have taken or are taking place. The Regional Director of Natural England, Geoff Sansome explored the possible options for maintaining Charnwood Forest's special value in the future. Workshop groups sparked some lively debate and the conclusion that action needs to be taken immediately to develop planning policies and other initiatives to protect and enhance the Forest. The proceedings of the conference will be made available on the County Council's website, but this will be only the first step in a wider process which will involve consultation with interested organisations and the public. Councillor Ernie White, Community Services Cabinet Member at the County Council, chaired the event and commented, "I was most impressed by the knowledge and enthusiasm for Charnwood Forest among the conference delegates. There was strong agreement that the Forest is a special place worthy of special treatment to enhance and protect its character, but that this must be done in a way that is sympathetic not only for visitors but also for its residents and farmers. I felt that there would be goodwill towards an initiative that aimed to deliver such benefits. I hope that goodwill can now be converted into a practical project and that the process of consultation continues in the

same positive vein."

Local Doctor Honoured by Queen.

We all congratulate SILEBY GP Prof Mayur Lakhanl as he has been awarded a CBE in the Queen's Birthday Honours list for his services to medicine.

Prof Lakhani, 47, practises at the Highgate Medical Centre in Sileby and lives in Rothley with his wife and three children. He has been chairman of the Royal College of General Practitioners (RCGP) since 2004 and is Visiting Professor in the Department of Health Sciences at Leicester University's School of Medicine.

Prof Lakhani was the youngest doctor to be appointed as chairman of council of the RCGP and combines that role with his practice commitments in Leicestershire.

Prof Lakhani said: "I want to thank the fantastic people of Sileby for allowing me the privilege of being their family doctor."

DOG FOULING - SILEBY MEMORIAL PARK

Sileby Parish Council continues to receive many complaints about the problem of dog fouling on the Memorial Park and around the village. The vast majority of dog owners are responsible and 'pick up' but there are the minority of villagers who feel that they are 'above the law'. It is an offence not to 'pick up' after your dog has fouled and fixed penalty tickets of £50 can be issued. If taken to court there is a maximum fine of £1000. Sileby Memorial Park is a recreation area for all to enjoy. Everyone should be able to use the facilities without having to check for dog mess everywhere. THIS IS A HEALTH HAZARD and has caused the death of children in the UK who have been in contact with dog faeces.

CHAIRMANS REPORT - 12 APRIL 2007

It was exciting and yet daunting to be elected but it fitted in very well with my retirement and I felt I could give the post the time and commitment it required.

Caroline Marshall was appointed our Partnership Manager at Charnwood Borough Council and she visited us to speak about her role and duties if needed. The clerks have contacted her on a couple of occasions and the liaison with C.B.C. appears to have improved.

Jon Timpson was appointed our new handyman/litter picker when Matt Richardson had to resign due to new time schedules in his main employment. We were sad to have to change again but Jon is proving to be a competent and likeable replacement who tells me he is very happy with his job and his colleagues.

Glynis Smith, our deputy clerk has achieved CILCA Qualification during the year. Congratulations on her hard work leading to some of her papers now being used in a training module. Beverly and Glynis work well together and I hope they enjoy the planned shared office facility once the alterations have been completed.

The lengthy toilet closure on the car park was a disgrace and is now having to be dealt with again. This is an area where we were completely dissatisfied with Charnwood Borough Council. Neither were we happy with the lack of police presence in the village. Betty Crick and I visited Inspector Yallop at Quorn Police Station to discuss the problems and stated a Police Community Support Officer was not adequate for a village our size with its parking and vandalism problems. The dedicated officer was often absented. We were assured reorganisation was already being discussed. This has led to a move and change of duties for Brian Geeson, whom we wish well. Our new P.C.S.O. is training in Barrow and will join us soon.

Parking will no longer be the remit of the police but the Street Wardens whose managers visited us to outline their perceived new duties. Another of their duties will be to deal with dog fouling and this was partly the reason we discontinued our contract with the lady we previously employed to deal with this constant problem. Read parish minutes from anywhere in the land and this problem always features! Let's hope the Street Wardens prove effective before long as at the moment they are only proving elusive.

Our wonderful children's play equipment was destroyed by arsonists who also burnt half a dozen litter bins. Sheer vandalism again blighted our park and it is little consolation that our insurance covered it. Ultimately we still pay through rocketing insurance costs.

Talks have taken place about a proposed new Health Centre. The Parish Council supports the plan in principle but the Youth Club site, despite some advantages, remains a contentious issue.

The planning of a pavilion on the park has been a major project during the past year. Sileby Town Football Club did an excellent job erecting their temporary changing facility, a much better option than the proposed mobile showers. We now have planning consent and can press on with tenders, builders and hopefully some community involvement in the project. The park enhancement has proved slow in developing and will have to proceed in tandem with the pavilion and car park construction.

The work done by the Sileby Cricket Club a couple of weeks ago should be used as encouragement for others. The visible difference to their ground is wonderful. It highlights the attitude in the club and their achievements last year. It was one of my proudest moments to present the plaque from the Parish Council in recognition of "their best season ever". This was just one of many 'Civic Duties' I have enjoyed during the past year. I first wore the chain to welcome Richard Hopkins as Rector on a hot July evening in a packed St. Mary's Church. I was very impressed mingling with so many dignitaries at the Mayor's Civic Service at Syston.

I was proud to represent Sileby at both Barrow and Sileby Armistice Parades and at Barrow Civic Service of which Ted Rogers should be very proud. I welcomed the Deputy Mayor and Mayoress to the Victorian Market and Christmas Lights and have tried to visit many things in the village both officially and because I thought I ought to, and I must say I have enjoyed them all, not forgetting Easter's Heritage Exhibition.

For me the highlight of the year was the visit of the Mayor and Mayoress of Charnwood to Sileby. They were genuinely pleased with their tour and delighted with their reception and welcome everywhere they went. They were interested and surprised by some things in Sileby

as they have mentioned when I have met them since. They too have made me feel welcome at their functions and I have valued their friendship and warm interest this past year. I thoroughly enjoyed last year. I was amazed at the time I could easily spend on council business and how many mornings I have been in the office. I've learnt a lot, not only about council business but councillors as well.

Your input and involvement vary but we all have lives to lead and work and home commitments to balance. I was sad when Robert Cross resigned as he was the young blood we needed but I think we all appreciated his problems and wish him well.

All your contributions are valued, not only Parish Councillors but also Borough and County Councillors

Thank you all for your involvement, encouragement and constructive criticism. Thanks to Betty for her friendship, her advice, her company and her able substitution in my absences. Patricia Staples.

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
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Sileby Village Plan.

I have lived in Sileby for 40 years now, and my children and grand children were born here (well nearly).



A warm welcome was extended by Iris Stevens to members who attended the recently held Annual General Meeting of the Friends of St Mary's Church, Sileby. They heard from Treasurer, John Burton that in the last 7 years £86000 had been received and raised by the Friends' work, and major repairs and refurbishment to the church, costing £72000, has been completed.

The electrics and lighting refurbishment was fully completed at the beginning of this year. This has completely changed the ambience of the church when the lighting is used, and provided a long term legacy for future generations within the church and village communities.

Current membership stands at 86 individuals and family members, providing a solid base for our fund raising activities. However, in a growing village, it was hoped that these numbers would soon be increased further.

Secretary, Eric Faulconbridge, outlined the events undertaken through the committee over the last year, and expressed the committee's thanks to everyone who had organised, helped or attended the events. Overall the Friends had had an excellent year, but new members, with new ideas was an ongoing forward requirement.

The meeting was told by Chairperson, Iris Stevens, that now the electrical work had been completed, the installation of toilets and a new kitchen area in church was the focus for this years' fund raising. Following this, a strategy for undertaking repairs to the church tower would be instigated.

St. Mary's church is a Grade II* listed building dating back to its origins in the 12th century. This relationship has proved to be very effective and Sileby still train and play at Jimmies to this day - but everyone is aware that our ultimate wish is to find our own ground somewhere in Sileby (if you can help us to make this a reality then please get in touch!). Since those early days STRFC has gone from strength to strength and we have played many matches both within Leicestershire and further afield we've even won a few of them! Our first out-of-county match took place in Bridgnorth - a trip which was thoroughly enjoyed by players and supporters alike. More recently, during the Easter bank holiday, we embarked on our first official overseas tour to Charleville-Mézières in the Champagne-Ardennes region of France. The tour was an excellent opportunity for the club to further consolidate our membership and extend our reaches into the World of Rugby, and was again a thoroughly enjoyable experience for everyone who went along.

EX-SERVICEMAN Roy Brown beamed with pride when the Royal Anglian Regiment marched through Loughborough in June – but it's a day he never imagined would happen. The Sileby Borough Councillor had only been serving in the Royal Leicestershire Regiment for a few months when it was re-branded as the Royal Anglian Regiment in 1964. It proved to be a controversial decision among veterans and those serving in the ranks at the time – although that was a distant memory on Tuesday, 19th June. For that's when the Regiment's 2nd Battalion exercised its right to march through Loughborough having been granted Freedom of Entry to the Borough by Charnwood Borough Council last September.

Cllr Brown, who joined the Army the day after his 18th birthday in May 1964, recalls the storm that blew up when the decision to merge the Royal Leicestershire Regiment with three other regional regiments was announced. He said: "The re-badging of the regiment was a very controversial thing – a lot of members felt strongly about losing Leicestershire from the regiment's name and were very upset. "We were lucky in some respects that they kept Leicestershire in the name for a while as other regiments lost their county name straight away. "It was a difficult decision at the time and was very sad. But it's a fantastic honour for them now. "Having been in the regiment when it was formed, it will be a proud moment for me now being a councillor of the Borough that has given them freedom of entry."

Cllr Brown has nothing but admiration for the Royal Anglians' current batch of troops, who have served in Bosnia, Sierra Leone, Northern Ireland, Afghanistan and Iraq in the last 15 years. "Times have changed and active service is very different now," added Cllr Brown, who served in Aden, Malta and Bahrain during his nine years service. "It's very difficult for young people but you've got to be proud of the lads they do a fantastic job. "When you look back on your army days, you realise what a big part of your life it was. It was an interesting time of my life and I had good times and bad times. "But when I look back at the old photos, there are a lot of laughs there.

Also in the march was SILEBY Sergeant Tom Crabbe. who announced his pride in getting the Freedom of Entry to his own Borough. Tom (28) from the 2nd Battalion, Royal Anglian Regiment, was among the 220 soldiers that exercised their right of Freedom of Entry to the Borough.

Sgt Crabbe, said: "All the lads seem to be taking the honour of the Freedom of the Borough in their strides but it is a proud moment. I'm sure our family and friends are even prouder though, I know my grandparents, parents and wife will be there to see the march and they're really looking forward to it.

Sgt Crabbe, who now lives in Sileby, has lived in Charnwood all his life, including in Loughborough and Shepshed.

Sgt Crabbe, added: "I've been in Royal Anglian Regiment or 'The Poachers' as we're known, since I left school; I'd had enough of education and wanted to travel and this offered me the perfect opportunity.

"I live with my wife, Alison, and Charnwood has always been 'home' to both of us and now we're based in the UK, I get to come back at the weekends, which is great but it was different when we were based in Iraq, last year."

When asked about what it's like to be in 'The Poachers', Sgt Crabbe spoke from the heart: "We're all a big family – it sounds cliché but it's true. We've all grown up together, we spend so much time together you're friends, more than colleagues and I think once you've been a 'Poacher', you'll always be one!"
